Hospital Building Fund Workers Announced

Mr. Paul Kilbane, Andover campaign chairman for the Jones Memorial Hospital Building fund campaign announced that workers had been selected for the campaign and that contacts for pledges were being made. He said that the campaign is of particular interest to Andover residents since the Jones Memorial Hospital is the closest service hospital available to residents here. A survey of the patients at the Jones Memorial Hospital over the last few years showed that 46% came from communities outside of Wellsville — a town Andover itself. This fact was instrumental in the allocation recently of Federal government Appalachia funds to the building fund.

Mr. Kilbane stressed that the Jones Memorial Hospital Building Fund offers a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for a family to establish a Memorial that stands before the public for generations and goes on giving long after other kinds of gifts have been long forgotten. A hospital memorial says something wonderful about a person that can never be forgotten even a hundred years from now. Looking at it from the practical side, giving to the Hospital helps to keep Andover tax dollars in the area and gives us a Municipal Hospital that is not a tax burden to the community and is free from the control of outside forces.

The individual tax benefits that are enjoyed by Hospital Building Fund subscribers naturally depends on the tax bracket they happen to be in. The individual can contribute up to 30% of his net taxable income and the entire amount would be deductible. For an individual in the top income brackets contributions can cost as little as \$23.50 per \$100.00 in after tax dollars. A complete analysis of the Memorials is available. The people of Andover, who raised \$10,000.00 in the 1951 campaign, are being asked for pledges toward the new building for which can be fulfilled over a three year period. Pledges made through Wellsville plants will be credited to the Andover campaign fund. Mr. Kilbane said that 28 campaign workers will conduct the appeal for funds in Andover. The

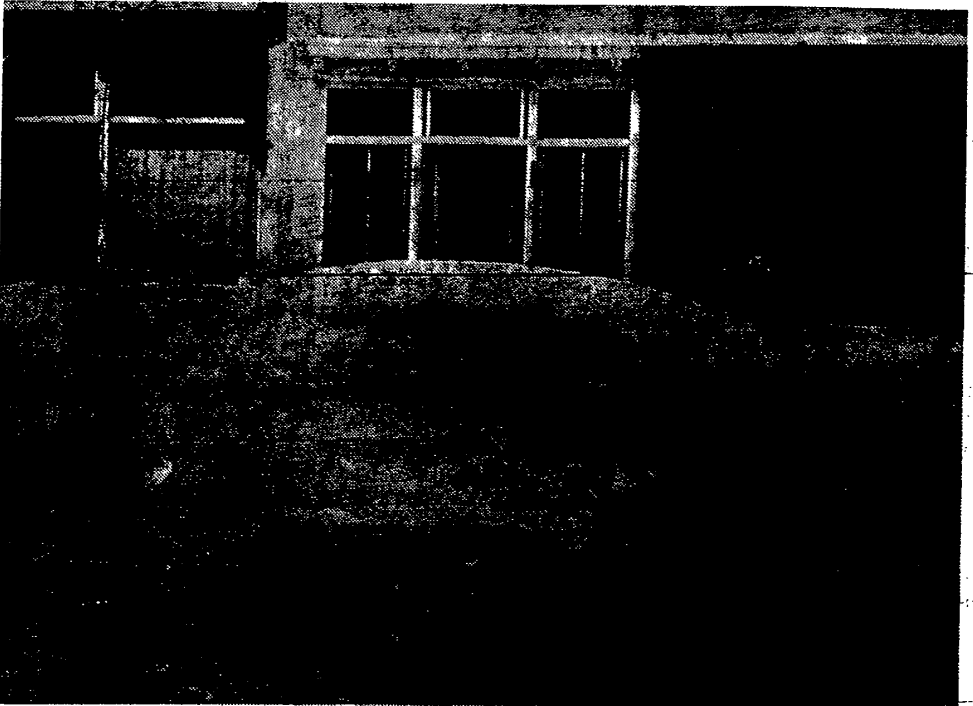
Craig Snyder was admitted to the Highland Hospital in Rochester Monday, and underwent surgery Tuesday.
