Brotherhood Week - A Reminder For Democracy In Action
Brotherhood Week (February 20 - 27) is a National observance sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews, a civic organization of religiously motivated people.

Founded in 1928 by Charles Evans Hughes, Newton W. Baker, S. Parkes Cadman, and other distinguished Americans, the NCCJ seeks through education and discussion to promote civic cooperation and mutual understandings among men of good will.

"Brotherhood Week", according to Sterling Brown, NCCJ President, "serves only as a fitting pause for us to evaluate our attitudes, extend our efforts, and re-dedicate ourselves to make democracy a living reality for all."

What are we A.C.S. students doing to promote brotherhood? We might find out by answering this question. Is each one of us doing our very best to promote good relationship among students? I believe there is a tendency in school to form "cliques". This should be abolished. Keep in mind the saying, "Be nice to people on the way up. You'll meet them on the way down".
