Blood Bank To Be In Andover March 4th

There is an ever increasing demand for blood supply within Rochester 12 county area; besides donating blood collected in event of civilian disaster and for mil-

of civilian disaster and for military needs.

Any bona-fied resident of the 12 county area can have his blood needs met anywhere in the United States, providing the hospital concerned will accept Red Cross blood on a "one-for-one" replacement basis. Residents incurring such "out-of-region" blood obligations should notify the Blood Center, so that proper action can be taken with the hospital or blood bank concerned. Anyone wishing to donate blood for credit for a patient can do so by making request at time of donating.

The Blood Program is supported Tinancially by 18 Red Crosschapters responsible for its operation through their annual fund campaigns. It costs them about \$7.80 to collect, process and deliver one pint of blood to a hospital for patient use.

However, the hospitals incur costs in transfusing blood, for which they charge "administration fee". This fee is varible from one hospitals' costs to store and crossmatch blood, and provide trained personnel to give blood transfusions. In no instance, however, is there a charge for the blood itself. This is a gift of volunteer donors and is passed on as such to the patient who receives it.

last night appeared to be what the manufacturer claimed it to be. However, in our opinion, it washighly over-priced — and it didn't seem to be necessary to have one with the control of t

However, in our opinion, it was highly over-priced—and it didn't seem to be necessary to nave one installed in every room in the house in order to be able to buy them. Then too, the apparent referral-type, bonus system of selling is highly questionable as far as being legal in New York State According to the information that we received from the N. Y. State Actorney General's Office last summer, this referral-type of seling program was outlawed effective around July.

In order to have some basis of comparison to make our comments on, we called the Gardner Fire Equipment Co., in Wellsville whom we have purchased Fire Extinguishers from in the past, and asked about Fire Alarm Systems and their cost. We were informed that they handled an approved type and that each unit cost \$20 a piece. Also, that they would sell one, or as many units as a purchaser wanted and that they would recommend the location of the units according to the danger points to fit in with the construction of each individual home. We were also informed that there were cheaper units as well as much mose elaborate ones on the market — some approved, some not. Each type of unit had certain advantages and disadvantages that the purchaser should take into consideration — as well as the availmach type of unit had certain advantages and disadvantages that the purchaser should take into consideration — as well as the availability and service of the firm selling the fire protection units.

Another telephone cable is being extended into the Rochambeau Ave., Extension and Elm Valley area, Roger J. Tuttle, manager of the Iroquois Telephone Corporation, announced today.

The cable will provide modern plant facilities for 147 subscribers as well as for future subscribers who may move into the area. The cable project will also provide cable repairs for the new Andover-Wellsville E. A. S. circuits which will be placed in service on April 17, 1966.

Approximately 1500 miles of

Approximately 1500 miles of wire are in the cables which are being put up as part of the project. The expansion will be completed in approximately sixty days.

In addition, 1.5 miles of cable are being replaced with new cable which will improve service in other parts of town.
