Juniors Take Exams

Several Andover Central School Juniors took the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Exam, sponsored by the Merit Scholarship Cooperation, on either Saturday or Tuesday under the supervision of Mr. Masters. Scholarships are given on the basis of scores achieved on the NMSQT exam. This year winners will be announced in late April or early May.

Merit Scholarships are financed through funds provided by the Ford Foundation. This exam is also the basis for scholarships sponsored by business firms, professional groups, trusts and individuals.

Merit scholarships provide around \$2 million per year in scholarship support. In 1965, 2,000 scholarships were awarded by the Merit Scholarship System. The total number of scholarships awarded annually depends upon the number of students tested. Sponsor participation this year is expected to provide about \$5.8 million. The scholarships may be used in a wide choice of colleges in all 50 states.

Students Attending Course At Alfred

A Computer Programming course is being offered by Alfred University to high school students and teachers from this area. The students from Andover who are participating are: Mary DeRemer and Camilla Wallace. Mr. Joseph Mamma, the high school mathematics teacher, is also attending some of the classes.

The course is being given by Dr. Sloan, head of the Math Department at Alfred University, from nine until eleven on Saturday mornings. The classes will continue for several weeks.

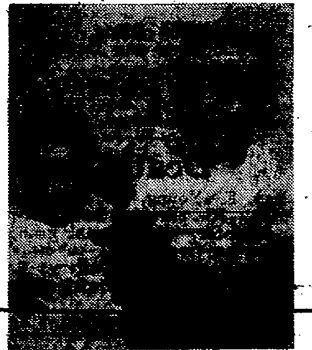
