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"News" Editor Attends Dinner At Governor's Home

Ralph A. Allen, Editor of the Andover News, attended a dinner at 7 p. m., Monday, March 7th at the Executive Mansion in Albany for weekly newspaper publishers and editors.

Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller said in his invitation, "During my recent and continuing series of visits throughout the State, one of my most rewarding experiences has been the opportunity to meet and exchange views with weekly newspaper publishers and editors."

Eighty-five weekly newspaper publishers and editors attended the dinner and had the opportunity to meet and exchange ideas with Governor and Mrs. Nelson Rockefeller as well as members of his staff which included Lt. Governor Malcolm Wilson; Louis J. Lefkowitz, Attorney General; Dr. T. Norman Hurd, Director, Division of the Budget; Robert Douglass, Counsel to the Governor; Alton G. Marshall, Executive Officer to the Governor; William Pfeiffer, Special Assistant to the Governor; Robert L. McManus, Executive Assistant to the Governor; Leslie Slote, Press Secretary to the Governor; Michael Seels, Appointments Officer; Daniel F. Barr, Assistant Press Secretary; William Tyler, Consultant; and Charlotte Morse, Secretary to the Press Secretary.

After a superbly served and very tasty dinner at which your local Editor had the honor of sitting across the table from Governor Rockefeller, the guests were greeted by the Governor who in turn introduced Lt. Governor Malcolm Wilson and Attorney General Louis Lefkowitz.

Lt. Governor Wilson expressed his thanks and appreciation to the Press for their courtesies extended to him in the past and assured them of his full co-operation in the future in any way that he could be of assistance.

Attorney General Lefkowitz then paid tribute to Governor Rockefeller for his temerity in facing unpleasant tax issues "head-on" and "face-to-face", and thanked the Press for their co-operation in carrying his message to the public whenever "commentators" and their rackets were exposed by his office.

Walter W. Grunfeld, Editor of the Marathon Independent and Vice-President of the New York Press Association, was then introduced by the Governor and gave a brief talk—asking only for "equal time" as that used by the other speakers. Walter, who has an admirable dry sense of humor, then complimented Governor Rockefeller on his audacity to exhibit the examples of "modern art" in his art collection gallery and asked if it was really true that one of the paintings was marked "this side up" on the back of the picture. Much to the amusement of everyone present, the Governor confirmed this remark and later on pointed out the picture to his guests.

Following the social amenities, Governor Rockefeller invited all of the guests up to the art gallery and then gave a brief presentation of the '66 budget, explaining where and how the money was to be spent.

A brief question and answer period then ensued with the Editors asking many questions ranging from High School Scholarships to who might be the best candidate for the opposition party. Judging from the participation and terrific responses from both the Publishers and the Governor's staff at this Press Dinner, it appeared to the writer that the entire evening was a success.

In passing it should be noted, that one of the questions asked was "What is the Governor's opinion of the type of television at the Executive Mansion?"

Village Board Hold Regular Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Andover Village Board was held Tuesday evening with all Board Members present and on time.

The minutes of the previous regular meeting were read and approved as well as the minutes of the Special Board Meeting in relation to extending the voting hours for the election next Tuesday.

Reports from the different departments were given with the Electric Superintendent noting that all of the new mercury vapor lights on hand were presently installed and in good operating condition.

Mayor Kilbane then read the resignation of acting Police Chief Middaugh and remarked that he hated to see him leave. He also stated that he had discussed the situation with Chief Middaugh and had expressed his belief that the Village Board would not meet the terms that had been requested. Without any more discussion on the matter, it was moved by Howard McAndrew, seconded by Robert Baker and carried, to accept the resignation. It was reported that there had been an inquiry into the Police job with the applicant wanting \$200 more salary than that which had been paid the former acting Chief.

It was moved and carried that the tentative budget be published March 31st and April 7th for a public hearing on April 12th at 8:00 P. M., in the Village Office.

The annual Village re-organization meeting was scheduled for Monday evening, April 4th. It was mentioned that the possibility of having to replace the Village Truck was going to have to be considered, since the present one is in rather bad shape.

The tentative budget was discussed and it was moved and carried to adopt the tentative budget with a tentative tax rate set at \$12.50 per thousand valuation.

The motion was also moved and carried to pay the cost of Blue Cross and Blue Shield Hospitalization plan for all of the full time Village Employees.

It was announced that free copies of the Village History for 1965 are available at the Village Office and Office of the Town Clerk.

The current bills were then read, ordered paid and the meeting adjourned.

News That's Print To Fit

Due to the coverage of other timely news, this column will have to live up to its title — and thus be rather short — if not sweet.

At the recent Village Board Meeting after hearing the minutes of the previous regular meeting read (at which we attended), and then hearing the minutes of the Special Board Meeting read (at which we were not invited to attend), it appeared to us that some type of "Summit Meeting" may have been held to discuss the resignation of Acting Police Chief Middaugh as well as the handling of the discussion of the proposed budget so that it wouldn't be able to be discussed intelligently by the voters — prior to the coming election.

We did not see — nor were we shown a copy of the proposed budget, as the only copies in evidence were in the hands of the Village Trustees and the Village Clerk.

Thus it makes it rather confusing to us as well as perhaps to many of the taxpayers why it was released to the Wellsville Reporter that there might be a drop in the tax rate of \$12.50 per thousand per assessed valuation when the proposed budget hasn't been made public so the voters would be able to analyze whether there would be an actual savings or not.

Then too, the question still hasn't been answered to our satisfaction why it was necessary to raise the tax rate from \$14 to \$16 last year (after election) when it was known that State Funds would be available and anticipated — the same as they will be for this coming year.

New York Hunters Recorded Third Highest Deer Take

New York hunters recorded the third highest deer harvest, including a record buck take, during the regular 1965 big game season.

The State Conservation Department has announced that a total of 67,073 deer was taken compared with previous highs of 72,677 in 1957 and 72,315 in 1956. During the 1964 big game season, hunters took a total of 59,872 deer.

The regular 1965 season harvest includes 42,599 adult bucks, 631 deer of both sexes under the party permit system and 84 deer of both sexes downed by archers.

The buck take tops the previous record of 41,367 set in 1957.

In addition to the total statewide harvest of 67,073 deer, 340 deer were taken during two special hunts held after the end of the regular season. A post season hunt near Lordville in Delaware County, produced 277 deer and 69 deer were taken in a post season hunt at the Seneca Army Depot.

On a regional basis, Catskill hunters took 18,838 deer, including 14,711 bucks, compared with a 1964 season take of 15,879. The Catskill region buck harvest is the fifth highest and includes a new Delaware County buck take record.

In the Adirondacks, hunters set a new Northern Zone record of 17,819 deer, exceeding the previous high of 15,690 in 1959 and the 1964 harvest of 13,460. A buck take of 11,382 is exceeded only by 1964 when 12,176 bucks were killed during the regular season which included special wilderness hunts. Department game specialists point out that fawns, yearlings and two and a half year old deer were taken in record numbers as a result of high fawn survival during the past two successive mild winters.

Hunters in Central and Western New York took 30,416 deer, including a record buck take of 17,716 which exceeds the previous high of 16,321 set in 1963. During the 1964 big game season, a total of 30,523 deer was taken in this region.

Stauben County in Central New York continues as the County with the highest total deer take with 6,033. Other Counties comprising the State's ten best deer areas are: Delaware (4,899), St. Lawrence (4,023), Sullivan (4,610), Allegany (4,000), Hamilton (3,219), Cattaraugus (3,950), Franklin (2,559), Oneida (2,108), and Herkules (2,108).

Record deer harvests were established in Cattaraugus, Chemung, Delaware, Lewis, Livingston, Ontario, St. Lawrence, Steuben, Washington and Yates Counties. New total harvest records
