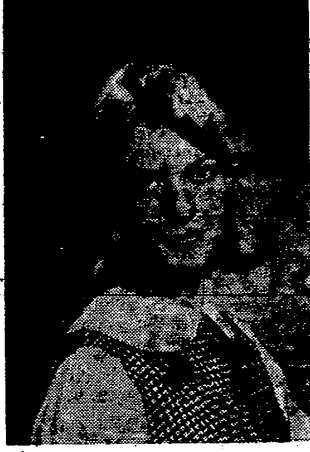

Well, now that the smoke has cleared away from the local election battle, it is up to every interested Citizen to get in back of our Village Officials — and see that things are taken care of that should be — with the hiring of a Police Officer and extra Police-man as Top Priority.

It is also the duty of every Citizen to point out things that they think are wrong to these officials, and if they are not corrected — then they should attend the Village Board Meetings and find out why.

In fact, if the Village Board would only have listened to the few people that attended the Board Meeting a year ago and given our ex-Police Chief a raise when they gave all of the other Village Employees a raise — they wouldn't be in the bad spot that they are in now. After all — what is a Village without a Police Force — and law and order?

More than likely, by the time that they get around to hire a Police Officer that is as capable as our past one — they will have to pay as much or more as the raise that he should have had.

436 Votes Cast In Local Election

436 Voters turned out for Tuesday's Local Village Election which is a surprisingly good turnout for a 3-way contest.

Merle Dibble scored 318 votes for Trustee to succeed himself for 2 years; Bob Baker drew 233 votes to succeed himself; Ronald Taylor running on the Independent ticket came up with 137 votes; and Larry Ryckman received 4 write-ins.

This year the polls were open until 9:00 p. m., which gave everyone working in Wellsville and Alfred a chance to vote that wanted to. This seemed to work out more satisfactory as there were several complaints last year when the polls were only open until 6:00 p. m.

The campaign itself was rather a quiet one with Ronald Taylor the challenging Candidate, asking a series of questions; while the Republican incumbents came out with a letter on Monday taking credit for everything good that has been accomplished lately — including the lowering of the Village Tax Rate — but of course omitted to mention that they were the ones that raised it \$2 per assessed valuation last year!

Frank W. Burrows Prominent Banker Dies

Frank W. Burrows, prominent banker, died Tuesday, March 15, 1966 in Mary's Nursing Home at Wellsville, after a long illness, was 89.

Born March 21, 1876, in Andover, he was the son of Alvin M. and Roxana Bradley Burrows. He was married in 1903 to Margaretta (Dorcas) Donagan, who died in 1957.

Mr. Burrows was graduated from Andover High School (Class of 1894), an Alumnus of Amherst College with a B.S. degree and was admitted to the Bar of New York State in 1904. In 1906 he, with his brother, Arthur, reorganized the Private Bank under the name of Burrows National Bank until 1917 when he accepted the position of Vice President and Treasurer of the Kensington Manufacturing Co., in New York City and continued in that capacity until 1935 when he returned to Andover and retired from active business.

Mr. Burrows was interested in the civic activities of Andover, a member of the Chamber of Commerce, the Exchange Club and served as a member of the Andover Board of Education in 1954 to 1955. He also served as President of the Andover Free Library Association.

His association with the Andover bank extended over many years, and he served as its vice president and on the Board of Directors.

He was a director of The Citizens National Bank, following its merger several years ago with the Andover institution.

The deceased was a member of the Andover Methodist Church, and a charter member of the Apollo Club of Wellsville.

Surviving are three grandchildren, Rosanna, John and Philip Burrows, all of Wellsville; and a niece, Mrs. Virginia Burrows Halpern of Marblehead, Mass. A son, John A. Burrows of Wellsville, died Feb. 25, 1965.

Funeral services were held at the James B. Mulholland Funeral Home, Church St., Saturday, The Rev. Roger F. Williams, pastor of the Andover Methodist Church officiated with interment in Valley Brook Cemetery, Andover.

Resolution Of Respect

The Advisory Board of the Andover Office of the Citizens National Bank record with sorrow the passing of Frank W. Burrows who had been one of the leading citizens of Andover for more than sixty years.

His family founded the Burrows National Bank with which he was associated until it merged with the Andover State Bank in 1933 and became the Andover National Bank. Mr. Burrows continued as an officer and director. When the Andover National Bank merged with the Citizens National Bank, Mr. Burrows became a member of the Andover Office Advisory Committee.

No man had stronger ties with the banking and business interests of the Village. His grandfather, D. C. Bradley had founded a private banking house, which continued until 1890 when it became the A. M. Burrows Banking Co. His family also conducted a mercantile enterprise.

He took great pride in his native Village and when active was always present at Board Meetings giving his advice, which looked forward to the betterment of his community.

His death removes the name of a pioneer family from the banking fraternity of Allegany County. The members of the Advisory Committee recall with great pride their association with this wise counselor and considerate gentleman.
