Jacksonville, Fla. — Navy Lieutenant Victor L. Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil L. Clark, First St., Andover, is serving at the Fleet Weather Facility in Jacksonville, Fla., which is preparing for the 1966 tropical cyclone or hurricane season, which officially begins June 1.

The facility has added an Automatic Picture Transmission ground read-out station, and will, for the first time, use daily television pictures from "Tiros" satellites to detect and forecast movement of tropical cyclones.

Another first this season will be the use of a computer-driven automatic map drawing device, which will save considerable man-hours.

The facility will still rely heavily on "Hurricane Hunter" reconnaissance aircraft. Reports from airborne meteorologists are plotted checked for accuracy, and transmitted to the National Hurricane Center in Miami. At the NHC, these reports are sent to interested activities throughout the United States.

In addition to hurricane season duties, the Fleet Weather Facility provides flight forecasts for aircraft operating out of Jacksonville, and weather forecasts for naval ships in the coastal waters of the southeastern U. S. on a round-the-clock, year-round basis.

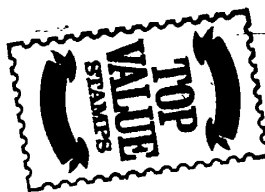
Local Student To Make Field Trip
