Baseball — Our National Game

Baseball is the national game of the United States, and a popular sport in many other countries. From spring to early fall, baseball receives more attention in the United States and Canada than any other sport. In winter, teams play in Latin-American countries. The game is also very popular in Japan and in the Philippines. Millions of boys eight years of age and older play the game every year in organized leagues of amateur teams. Many older boys and men play an industrial and semi-professional teams.

Major league baseball teams feature the best professional players and attract the most attention. More than fifteen million fans crowd into baseball parks each year to watch the stars play. Many millions more watch the games on television or listen to radio broadcasts.

Baseball was developed from the game of cricket and an old English sport called rounders. Boston youngsters in colonial times played games called "one old cat" and "two old cat" using one or two bases. Later they developed a game called "town ball" that had four bases and a batter's box between home base and first base. Cricket enthusiasts in New York City developed a similar game called "The New York Game"

Abner Doubleday, who later became a noted Army officer, laid out a diamond-shaped field with four bases sixty feet apart in 1829, at Cooperstown, New York, and named the game "baseball". The National Baseball Museum and Hall of Fame opened in Cooperstown in 1939.

Alexandre J. Cartwright, a New York City surveyor, designed the game almost exactly as it is played today. He established standard rules about 1845, and laid out the diamond with most of the distances used today. He also organized the New York Knickerbocker team. The New York Nine beat
