Troopers Exam To Be Held May 7th

Albany — A written competitive examination for troopers in the New York State Police will be held May 7 at 15 locations throughout the state, Superintendent Arthur Cornelius, Jr., has announced.

As a result of action by the current State Legislature supporting a recommendation by Governor Rockefeller, appointments will be made at a starting salary of \$6,225. The previous starting salary was \$5,700.

Candidates must be at least 21 years old and not have passed their 29th birthday at the time of appointment. However, persons within three months of their 21st birthday, otherwise eligible, will be admitted to the examination and those beyond the maximum age may in certain circumstances receive an offset for time spent in military service.

Persons interested in the examination may obtain application forms at any State Police station, or by writing to the New York State Police, Public Security Building, State Campus, Albany, New York, 12226. To be considered for admission to the examination, a single completed application must be returned to the Albany address, postmarked by midnight April 30.

Candidates must have United States citizenship, a high school or New York State equivalency diploma, a minimum height of 5 feet 9 inches, with weight in proportion to build, and be free of physical defects. They must also possess a driver's license, with a satisfactory driving record, and have nothing in their background indicating character defects. Persons must

be residents of the state at the time of appointment. The written examination will cover subjects testing the general knowledge, intelligence and aptitudes of the applicant for a law enforcement career.

A list of appointments, which will be in force for at least a year, or until exhausted, will be compiled from those attaining a passing grade of 75 per cent. Candidates will be selected in order of their passing grade for further qualification requirements. These include a medical examination and agility test; an oral interview to determine mental alertness, initiative, personality, judgment and appearance, and a background investigation.

The new examination will be held in the following areas: Bay Shore, L. I., Buffalo, Binghamton, Glens Falls, Horseheads, Albany, Middletown, New York City, Olean, Pottsville, Poughkeepsie, Rochester, Syracuse, Utica and Watertown.

Persons whose applications are accepted will be notified where to report for the examination.

U. S. Navy Has Great Need In The Seabees


