Little Genesee Producer Wins Co. Maple Crown

Sanford Farms of Little Genesee was crowned the 1966 Maple King of Allegany County at the Annual County Maple Festival held at Cuba Grange Hall on the evening of April 18. Their card-table size display of the various maple products was one of seven entered on that evening by the various producers around the county. The Sanford exhibit scored 93 out of a possible 100 points with their excellent flavored fancy sirup, smooth hard sugar, maple cream and fluff and the maple sugar cap house topping off the total display.

Second in line was a tempting display of products by Mr. and Mrs. Merritt Vossler and Sons of Niles Hill Road, Wellsville, and third by Milton Scutt and Son of Friendship.

The County Maple display and Festival is held near the end of each season in recognition of the excellent job of marketing done by maple producers in the county. Mr. and Mrs. Ed Reynolds of Franklinville, well known dairyman and sirup producer of Cattaraugus County, were the judges. Other entries were those of Mr.

Speaker of the evening was Prof. Fred Winch, Extension Forester from Cornell University, who commented on the good position of Allegany County producers having not only a high quality crop this year but a good sized harvest. This is in contrast to many other areas of the state which have had a very short season. An extremely short season has been experienced in the sirup producing areas of Ohio, Pennsylvania, as well as areas of Michigan and Wisconsin. In fact, the season in Allegany County and surrounding areas is not yet finished on many farms. The cold

nights and not too much warming in the day has brought on run after run of quality sap just starting a tinge of buddiness in some places allowing producers a little chance to rest up between the often all night vigils over the boiling pans.
