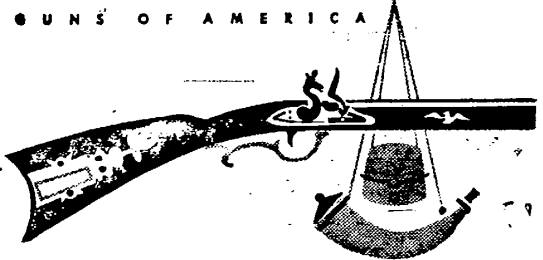

A distinctly American flintlock rifle, developed by German and Swiss Colonists in Pennsylvania, early 1700's. Got its popular name from its wide use by frontiersmen in Kentucky and Tennessee. Patterned after early European rifles, Colonists lengthened its barrel for better accuracy, and reduced its caliber to conserve lead.
