They had such wax figures as Ben Franklin and his kite; Daniel Boone, Davey Crockett, William F. Brady, President Johnson and his family. We also saw wax figures of the former Presidents, John F. Kennedy, Eisenhower, Truman, F. D. Roosevelt and many foreign diplomats.

The one place that interested me the most was the Shrine of Immaculate Conception, a very large Cathedral. Mosaic murals adorned the walls. When we were there it was Easter Sunday and they were having services, which were presented through a microphone. The outside was also very pretty.

I especially liked the Capital Building because of its vast and beautiful architecture on the inside. Each room had a different decor. The chandeliers in the building were incredible. I've never seen anything more colorful. The marble floors were beautiful also.

I was particularly impressed with the Arlington National Cemetery. This cemetery contains the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, which gave me a very proud, warm, feeling, and the grave of President Kennedy. The white of the tombstones, the green of the grass, and the precision of the rows were all very distinct in the warm morning sun.
