Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz Speaks At Wellsville C of C

Here are some excerpts of remarks of Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz at a dinner sponsored by the Wellsville Chamber of Commerce in the Hotel Fassett, Wellsville, N. Y., at 7 P. M., on Thursday, April 28:

A dynamic and effective Chamber of Commerce is an indispensable ally of business and the most important link in its liaison with the community. The Chamber is often an industrial doctor in times of stress; it is a partner in prosperity when conditions are favorable; it is an active agent for improved conditions, both economic and governmental.

The Chamber of Commerce studies the industrial climate and encourages measures which aid commerce and business. It also plays the role of advisor and friend to the community and in this area it performs, I believe, one of its most effective functions.

The most desirable areas for the establishment and maintenance of business are not only those where there are adequate sources of supply, competent labor and stable markets but those where the social structures of the community and the state are so constructed as to help in the development of the business.

There is much more to the conduct of a business, large or small, than the costs of production, the matter of taxes, and the stability of the markets. How can one translate into the cold figures of debit and credit the work of the Chamber of Commerce and the community to build a foundation upon which the business can work and grow and the employees can prosper and be happy?

The community which seeks to attract and keep business knows through the work of the Chamber of Commerce that it must provide the resources which will achieve this goal. Good public schools, competent and adequately paid teachers, higher educational facilities within easy access, good highways and transportation, recreational facilities available to employees and their families as well as a well-ordered community governed by able leaders, are all vitally essential to the growth and prosperity of business.

We have all heard of and felt concern over that fact that some businesses, have chosen to move from the northeast section of the United States to other sections, particularly in the south and southwest. But I say to these businessmen and to any others who may consider such a move: Consider seriously the social structures of the community where any relocation is contemplated. Are the existing conditions there conducive to a contented staff of employees as well as to the development of business? Can these communities offer the enlightened social structures of New York State? I believe that you will agree with me, that there are few areas that can provide more attractive facilities than New York State.

N. Y. S. Highway Projects For 1966-67 To Cost \$19 Million

Governor Rockefeller announced today that highway projects costing nearly \$19 million will be carried out during the 1966-67 fiscal year in the Hornell area and southwestern New York State.

Legislative approval of his budget permits further work on the Southern Tier Expressway and the provision of other facilities which will enhance the safety, ease and convenience of motorists in the area, the Governor said.

Highway work costing \$39 million currently is under way in the District comprising the counties of Allegany, Steuben, Yates, Schuyler, Chemung and Tioga.

The 1966-67 program also will provide for construction of the first section of the North-South Arterial in Hornell. The 0.6 mile project will cost an estimated \$1,945,000, will extend from Main Street to Pleasant Street, and will provide a bridge over the Erie-Lackawanna Railroad tracks. The four-lane highway will be built chiefly on new location east of Canisteo Street.

Other major projects to be undertaken (depending on completion of plans and availability of right-of-way) are:

Reconstruction of Routes 36 and 70 in Steuben County, 3.5 miles, \$1,300,000. Route 89 will be reconstructed mostly on new location through the Village of Arkport and continuing 1.8 miles north of the village. Route 70 (West Avenue) will be reconstructed from its intersection with Route 36 to the village line and north a half mile. Within the village, the streets will be constructed to a width of 44 feet between curbs. Outside the village, a two-lane pavement will be built and shoulders will be stabilized.

Widening and resurfacing of 10.4 miles of Route 305, Allegany County, \$1,200,000. The project will extend from Belfast to a point two miles north of the Village of Cuba.

Widening and resurfacing sections of Routes 21, 245 and 371 in Steuben County, \$800,000. The project will include widening and resurfacing of 3.3 miles of Routes 21 and 245 between Wayland and North Cohocton, 1.5 miles of Route 371 between Cohocton and North Cohocton and 1.3 miles of Routes 21 and 245 between North Cohocton and the Ontario County Line.

Reconstruction of 0.57-mile of County Road 81 near East Woodhull in Steuben County, including a new bridge over the North Branch of Tuscarora Creek, \$225,000.

In addition to the projects executed by contract, still other work will be carried out by Department of Public Works forces.
