This month, Andover Central School is losing a highly respected and esteemed faculty member. Mrs. Harriet Schwarzenbach, after 37½ years at Andover, Mrs. Schwarzenbach has resigned from the teaching staff.

Mrs. Schwarzenbach received her initial training at the North Cohocton Training School. She began her teaching career at a grade school in Canadice where she taught for three years. She left this position to further her education at Geneseo State Normal.

In the fall of 1928, Mrs. Schwarzenbach joined the Andover faculty, teaching fourth grade. She continued in this position for three years, when she changed to teaching in the sixth grade.

During her years in sixth grade, many students and even their parents before them will recall their year with Mrs. Schwarzenbach. Her social studies classes were greatly enriched with her many possessions purchased in the country she has visited. Mrs. Schwarzenbach always expected the best from each of her students. Many of the qualities she instilled in her classes have undoubtedly enriched the lives and achievements of her pupils.

Mrs. Schwarzenbach has no definite plans for the future but hopes to do some traveling. The students and Alumni of Andover Central School wish Mrs. Schwarzenbach a rewarding and enjoyable retirement.

WARNING

The Village Board wishes to call the Section of Sanitation in the Ordinances of the Village of Andover to the attention of local residents.

Section (a) No person, except with the permission of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover, N. Y. shall allow any accumulation of manure, garbage, or other refuse of like or similar nature to remain for a period of more than one week on any premises occupied or used by him within said Village.
