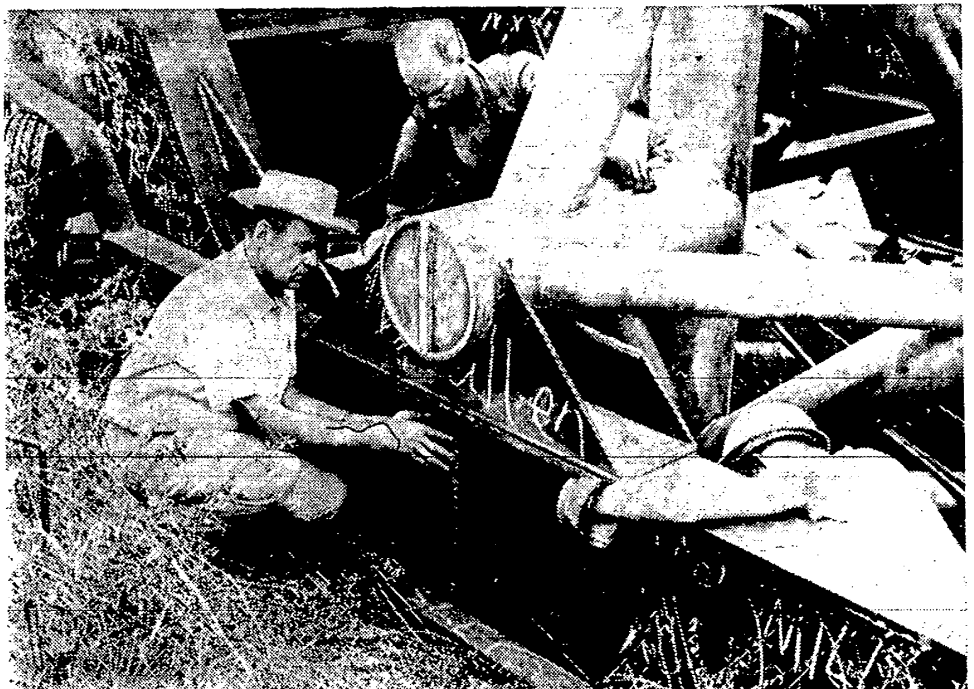

In the Modern Class, Lyle Cornelius driving '04 was back for the first time this season and chalked up a win in one of the heats and was putting up a good battle in the Feature until he had a little trouble with his car and had to back off a little and wound up in the 4th slot.

Floyd Greene, No. 7, last week's winner, had the bad luck to get hit broadside in the No. 2 turn by the driver of No. 69, and as he fought for control, lost precious seconds which enabled Paul Hidek, No. 6%, and Ray Poyer, No. 1M, another newcomer to the track, to get by him. From then on it was a rip-roaring battle between Paul and Ray throughout the rest of the race and ended up with Paul crossing the finish line just a couple of car lengths ahead of Ray.

For a brief re-cap of the racing results: In the Amateur Class, Don Chalmers, No. 218, took the first heat; Chuck Wright, No. 66 won the 2nd; and Larry Scouten No. 1%, picked up the "Consy" in the Feature — Chuck Wright,
