

A.C.S. Alumni Banquet Well Attended

225 persons attended the Annual Andover Central School Alumni Banquet on Saturday, May 28 at 7 p. m., in the school cafeteria. The Class of 1967 served the delicious roast turkey dinner.

Rev. Floyd Aldrich gave the Invocation and Benediction. George Karcanes, Class of 1944 was a most capable and witty toastmaster.

Following the dinner, W. Basil Dunham, Class of 1946, Alumni President, welcomed the group to the school and extended sincere congratulations to the graduating Class of 1966. In his introduction of Robert Joyce, 1966 Class President, Mr. Karcanes noted that Mr. Joyce's mother, Mrs. Joseph Joyce was present, his sister, Mrs. Jocelyn Hazzard, Class of 1956 was celebrating her 10th reunion and his sister, Mrs. Patricia McCormick was present to celebrate her 20th reunion of the Class of 1946. Impromptu remarks were given by Mrs. Reva Clarke McCaffery, Class of 1916; Mrs. Eleanor Northrup Briggs, Class of 1941; Mrs. Norma Steadman Gavin, Class of 1946 and Mr. Dean Fisher, Class of 1951.

She compared advances in education in fifty years and stressed to the Class of 1966 that regardless of what opportunities may lie at hand, the main object is to have a goal and with fervor and ambition press onward to the achievement of that goal. Explosive Ordnance And Fire Fighting Hazards Courses To Be Given

The Civil Defense Office has arranged with the 40th ORDNANCE DETACHMENT of the United States Army for the presentation of the Explosive Ordnance Reconnaissance Course and a lecture course on the Hazards in Fighting Fires Involving Explosives.

The course includes up-to-date information which can be released on a non-classified basis, on nuclear weapons and sabotage devices.

The explosive section of the course will be held on Monday and Tuesday, June 13th and 14th from 6:30 to 10:30 P. M., and the fire fighting hazards section on Wednesday, June 15th from 7:30 to 9:30 P. M. The meetings are to be held in the County Court House at Belmont in the Court Room on the second floor.

These courses are open to police, Civil Defense police, firemen, Civil Defense personnel and Plant Protection personnel.

County Director Robert L. Coulter in commenting on the offering of the courses said "With the movement of materials of the kind involved through the area by truck and rail as well as in the air, it is felt that these courses will better prepare Allegany County for any emergency."

The all-expense paid trip for the two men is one of the awards received by the district which was named the out-standing district in the state in the Goodyear sponsored contest.
