### Your Driving — A Gamble?

In 1965 more automobiles than ever before traveled the highways of our nation. To cope with increasing traffic, vast road building programs continue at a rapid pace, automobile manufacturers provide added safety features to afford the motorist more effective protection, and communities waged intensive safety campaigns.

Despite these efforts, the past year witnessed more traffic fatalities than ever. The property loss of these accidents costs Americans billions of dollars annually. But the grief and anguish caused by such accidents will never be measured in monetary terms.

Even though teens are supposed to be more educated in the driving field, due to Driver Education courses, etc., they have the highest rate of fatal traffic involvement. In 1964, more than three million drivers who had not yet reached their twentieth birthdays were involved in traffic accidents. More than 8,000 of them were fatal.

These statistics, unfortunately, are not taken seriously by teens.

Attitude is vitally important. As a motorist, you enjoy a privilege that demands not only skill, quick reflexes, and alertness, but also healthy respect for the rights and property of others. Patience is hard to maintain in congested traffic, but the hurried driver can find himself delayed by a crash. Courtesy, a trait far too often ignored on the highway, pays worthwhile dividends, while lack of consideration for the other driver can prove to be expensive.

Today teens have too great a future to gamble with disregard for the law. Show the responsibility you need for the future now! Remember this: You and millions of other drivers will be safer for remembering.
