However, due to the cir- cumstances concerning the amount of the damages done, it was ce- cided that it didn't warrant the services of a short-handed staff at the nearby barracks.

With no one else to turn to, Sam turned Private Investigator himself and with the aid of ti- parents of the youths involved, brought the case to a successful conclusion — to the apparent satis- faction of everyone involved.

When writing our Editorial this week, we had no knowledge or rumors to go on as to whom was responsible for the damage done to the above mentioned plant-box. We were merely pointing out how things could be managed by enterprising youngsters without their parents knowing anything about it when they use the old- dodge of "sleeping out".

Thus, since the "Plant Box Case" is closed, we hope that other Parents will heed this example and, by using a little closer supervision, put an end to the late-night roam- ings of the 15 lad "Pack" that re- cently disturbed so many local residents and taxpayers. Espe- cially, since we feel sure that com- petent authorities would be able to identify these youths with just a little investigation. 10-4?
