Notice of School Meeting Andover Central School

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the annual meeting of the inhabitants of Central School District No. 1 of Andover, Allegany County, qualified to vote at school meeting, in said district will be held at the schoolhouse in said district on Tuesday, July 12, 1966 at 8:00 o'clock p. m., for the transaction of such business as is authorized by the Education Law.

And notice is also given that a copy of the statement of the amount of money which will be required for the ensuing year for school purposes exclusive of public monies, may be obtained by any taxpayer in the said district during the seven days immediately preceding the annual meeting except Saturday, Sunday or holiday at each of the following schoolhouses in which school is maintained during the hours designated.

Andover Central School, 9 - 12 a. m., and 1 - 4 p. m.

And notice is also given that petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the board of education must be filed with the clerk of the district not later than June 28, 1966.

The following vacancies are to be filled on the Board of Education:

Term: Five years (Name of last incumbent: Anthony Dougherty.

Each vacancy requires a separate petition to nominate a candidate to each separate office. Each petition must be directed to the clerk of the district, must be signed by at least twenty-five qualified voters of the district, must state the name and residence of the candidate and must describe the specific vacancy for which the candidate is nominated including at least the length of the term of office and the names of the last incumbent.
