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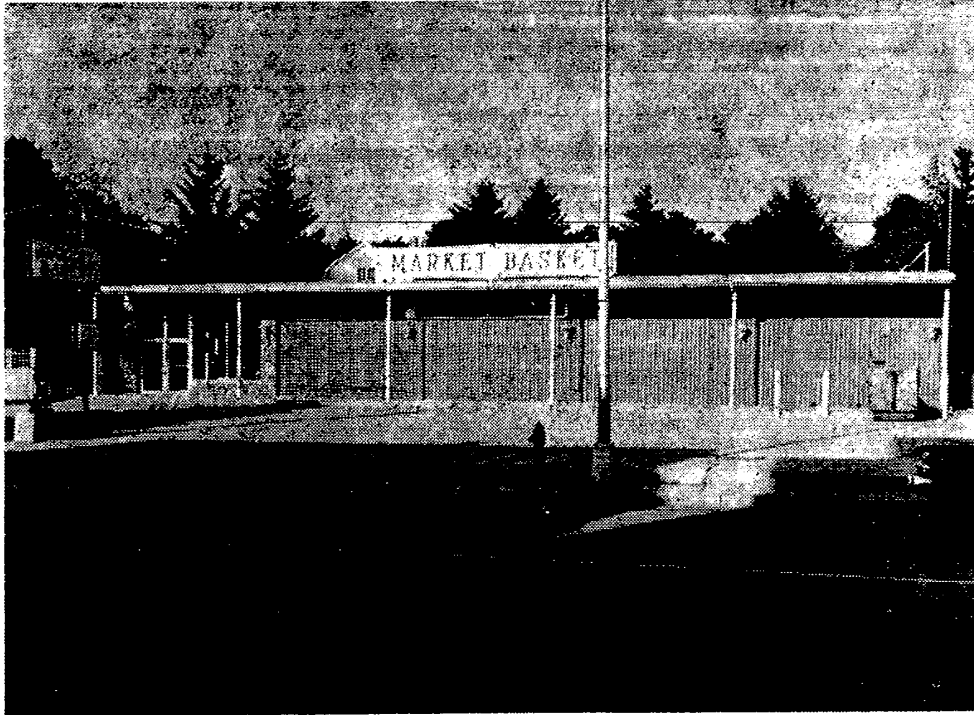

## New Market Basket Super-Market To Open Wednesday, July 13th

It has been announced today by Market Basket representatives, that their New Super-Market, located opposite the Post Office in Andover, will be stocked completely and open for business next Wednesday morning, July 13th at 8:00 A. M.

Harry Maddren, Jr., who has been in charge of the Market Basket Store here in Andover for the last year and a half, will be manager of the grocery and produce department, with Millard Smith in charge of the new modern meat department.

According to Mr. Maddren, the new store will be open from 7:30 A. M., to 5:30 P. M., every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday and on Thursday and Friday from 7:30 A. M., until 8:00 P. M. He also stated that the new store is completely stocked with a wide variety of food supplies, fresh meat and vegetables as well as other daily household needs.

The new store will employ 5 full-time employees and around 6 part-time help which will place several more people on the pay-roll. It is built following a Colonial Design and is of modern construction covering, 120 square feet of area with ample parking for customers.

Manager Harry Maddren was also happy to announce that free orchids will be given to all Lady shoppers during the opening week; the Andover School Band will present a Band Concert in front of the new store Friday evening at 7:00 P. M., and door prizes will be given away Saturday night.
