## Hornell Firm Wins Road Contract

Governor Rockefeller has announced the award of a contract for \$1,218,459 to A. L. Blade and Sons Inc., of Hornell, N. Y., for improvement of Route 305 from Route 17 south of Belfast southwesterly 10.27 miles to the Health Camp Road in the town of Cuba, Allegany County.

The firm submitted the lowest of five bids for the project.

The highway will be widened from 18 to 22 feet and resurfaced with asphalt concrete. The project includes construction of a new one-span bridge, about 25 feet long, over Black Creek near Crab Hollow Road.

Scheduled for completion by December 1, 1967, all work will be under the supervision of William J. Dennis, District Engineer in charge of the Department of Public Works' District Office at Hornell.

## Three In Hartsville Family Killed In Auto Accident

A Hartsville couple and their two-year-old daughter were killed Thursday night around 11:30 when their car overturned at the intersection of the Call Hill Road and the Hartsville-Andover Road (County Road 28) 2 miles south of Hartsville.

Henry W. Wilson, 46, his wife, Sylvia, 28, and their daughter, Tammy, were pronounced dead at the scene by Corner Byron Collins of Canisteo.

Five other children in the car were injured. Two of them, Kevin 4, and Sherry Krise, 16, were listed in "poor" condition at Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester.

Kevin was believed to have a fractured skull, and Sherry a broken jaw and cuts on her face and knees. Sherry is Wilson's daughter by a previous marriage and is now the adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Krise, Town of Woodhull (Elkland, Pa., RFD 1).

In "fair" condition at the St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell were Rory Wilson, 9, scalp and chest cuts; Arnold Wilson, 5, forehead bruises; and Candie Wilson, 7, shoulder injuries.

State police at Bath said Wilson was driving east on the Call Hill Road and was descending one of the steepest hills in the area, when the brakes on his 1962 sedan apparently failed. The family was returning home after picking up a television set which had been repaired.

The car shot down the hill at high speed, could not make the turn at the intersection, and overturned in a ditch.
