The community was shocked by the fatal accident Monday, July 11 taking the life of Harlan L. Warriner, 20, near Painter, Va. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Warriner, Jr. of West Jasper. Harlan was employed as a supervisor at Flint Farms Inc. in Virginia, owned by Dan Flint of Dansville. He and Bruce Stubbs of Cuba were pushing their truck from the highway, that apparently had run out of gas.

Three tractor-trailers came from the rear and one managed to get around them. The second struck the smaller truck killing Harlan and the third crashed into the wreckage. Stubbs was uninjured but treated for shock.

Harlan graduated from Greenwood Central School in 1964 and in June from the State Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred, where he majored in Agricultural Business. He held the Empire Farmer degree from the Future Farmers of America and had been secretary of the Steuben County F.F.A. His employment was through the Ag-Tech College and he had worked there the summer of 1965.

Besides his parents he was survived by a brother, Wayne Jr., a Veterinary student at Cornell University and a sister, Carol of Greenwood Central School. His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Warriner of West Jasper and Mr. and Mrs. Archie Foster of Jasper and great grandmother Mrs. Jennie Heckman of Jasper. Rev. Roger Williams and former Pastor Rev. Robert Myers officiated Friday at 2 p.m. in the Methodist Church.

There was a large attendance at the Annual School Meeting Tuesday night at the Central School. Virgil Hussey was elected chairman. Principal Robert Hoagland gave a report of the state of the school and the proposed building program. There were no questions as a special meeting was held the week before to discuss the improvement and building program. Tellers for the election were Margaret Murray, Harry Redmond, Douglas York and Bryan Higgins. The Annual Budget of \$441,000 was approved 147 to 10 votes. The building program including a swimming pool, shower rooms, agricultural shop, classrooms and cafeteria at an estimated cost of \$320,000 plus \$70,000 to reconstruct and equip the existing building was approved 121 to 34.

Walter Jackson, unopposed to replace Carol Bassett not running for office, received 143 votes for a 5-year term on the Board of Education. The cost of the building to the local voters is included in the approved budget which is raised \$30,000 from this year's budget of \$314,000.

Over 100 students are registered for Summer School at Greenwood Central School. Four buses collect the children for classes from 9 to 11 A. M. A Science enrichment section has been added this year for grades 3 - 6 and a section for older students taught by Mr. DeMarte. Mrs. Virginia York and Mrs. Kathleen O'Hagan are teaching reading in grades 1 - 5. The grade library is open for students wishing to borrow books. Miss Cheryl Hussey is in charge of music. In recreation Jolene Cheesman supervises girls play program 10 - 12 A. M., and Donald Tolhurst is in charge of boys at the same time.

A bus takes 14 older youths to Summer School in Hornell at 7:30 each morning. At one o'clock a bus takes children to the Hornell Swimming Pool.

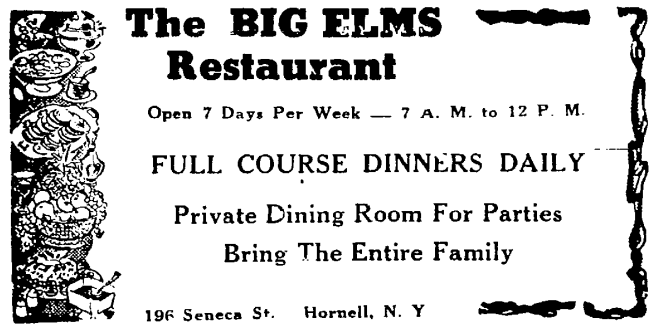
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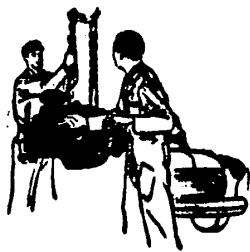
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
