According to information released this week, Marianne Meyn was selected by International Fellowship to go to Guayaquil, Ecuador as an Exchange Student representing Andover Central School. Marianne left International Airport, Buffalo, June 29th, 1966 with around 70 other students going to other South American Countries and upon her arrival in Ecuador was assigned and welcomed into a South American home. She is currently residing at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Julio Jurado, Guayaquil, Ecuador and has two Ecuadorian sisters and a brother.

Marianne's activities while attending Andover Central School included: three years of Band; Student Council Representative. Sophomore year; four years of Chorus; Camera Club; F.R.A.; Pep Band; Dance Band; Cheer Leader. Sophomore year; Vice-President Junior Class; Library Club; Girls Athletic Club; and was also a member of the Junior Play cast as well as receiving the honor of being crowned "Queen" of the Junior Prom.

At the present time, Marianne is on a train trip from Guayaquil to Quito, Ecuador over the Andes Mountains and will fly back to her Foster Home by plane this week-end.

Miss Meyn elected to go to Guayaquil so that she could become more affluent in speaking Spanish as well as to meet the many Exchange Students who had been visitors in her Andover home in the past. Then too, the promise of a warm, resort-type climate, and the chance to meet many new exciting people was also very alluring.

According to Marianne's present plans, she will return to Buffalo International Airport by plane sometime during the first week in September.

According to the many letters received by her parents, Marianne is enjoying the many elaborate parties which are frequently held.

On her present trip to Quito, she will be a guest at the home of Magda Montalvo and Sonia Jaramilla and is accompanied by Theresa, her Ecuadorian Sister. The two girls that are acting as hosts were in Conrad Church's home for a year as Exchange Students and graduated from Andover Central High in 1965.

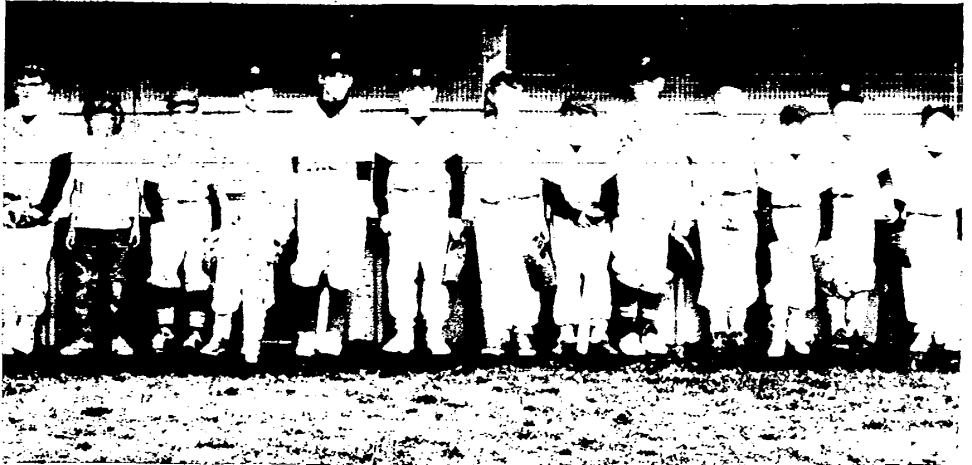

For residents of Elm St., it is realized that it is an inconvenience — but this is only temporary — while the improvement is permanent!

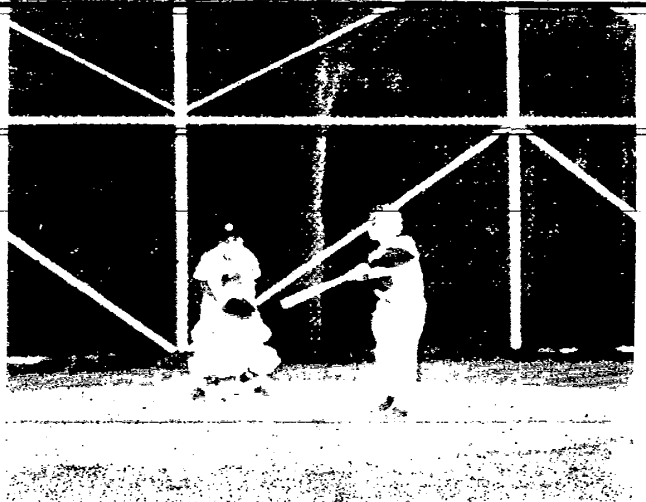

Under the heading of "Bills Approved by the Governor" — Legislation providing what he termed "a convenient mechanism" for obtaining Federal aid in the construction of water and sewer systems in rural areas was signed into law this week by Governor Rockefeller.

"The Federal Consolidated Farmers Home Administration Act provides that the Secretary of Agriculture may assist non-profit corporations in the construction of water and sewer systems in rural areas", the Governor said, "This bill, which was developed at my request by the State Office for Local Government, will provide a convenient mechanism for New York State residents to take full advantage of this important Federal Assistance."

Isn't that something? Now all we have to do is find out what it means and includes!

## Wayne Blauvelt, Jr., Dies By Electrocution

Wayne Edward Blauvelt, Jr., 17, of Bolivar, RFD died by electrocution at about 9 p. m. Monday when a 30-foot section of aluminum irrigation pipe came in contact with a 4,100-volt transmission line.

Wellsville state police reported the youth was removing the pipe through a peak window at the top of a barn at the Belvidere Farms in the Town of Angelica in Allegany County. The farm is owned by Eugene Pfunter.

Blauvet apparently overextended the pipe and it touched the electric line about 25 feet from the window, police said.

Efforts of the Belmont Fire Department and those of Dr. Paul Rems of Belmont, an Allegany County coroner, to revive the youth were of no avail. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Working with the youth at the time was his brother, Clifton, 15, and Benjamin Stonemetz, 37, of Shinglehouse, Pa.

He would have been a junior at Bolivar Central High School.

Besides his brother, young Blauvelt is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Blauvelt; three sisters, Mrs. Theodore (Buelah) Phillips of Shinglehouse, Marion and Suzy Blauvelt, both at home; three other brothers, William, Wesley and Robert, also at home; and paternal grandfather, Harry Blauvelt of Shinglehouse.
