Social Security News

When do I enroll in medicare if I'm going to be 65 in the near future or later years? This is a question the Olean Social Security Office receives quite often, said L. J. Dziadkovicz, district manager.

Persons who are not yet 65 will have seven months in which to enroll for medicare. These seven months are the three months before the month they are 65, the month in which they are 65, and the three months after the month in which they are 65.

The medical insurance part of the health insurance program becomes effective on different dates depending on when the application is filed in the seven month period. It is a definite advantage to file in the three month period before the month of reaching age 65. The medical insurance is then effective with the first day of the month of your 65th birthday. If you apply in the month you are 65 or in the following three months, your medical insurance protection will not begin immediately, although you will have hospital insurance as soon as you apply.

A person who is not yet 65 but who is working or has worked under social security and has not filed an application, should get in touch with the social security office in the three months before he is 65. In this way you become entitled to the health insurance benefits, even though, because of your work, you may not receive a monthly benefit. Additional earnings paid after you apply will be automatically included in refiguring your benefit rate.

The Social Security Administration has always urged those persons who have not filed for benefits to get in touch with them three months before they are 65. Now with medicare it is more important to do so.

For further information phone, write, or call at the Olean Social Security Office, located at 153 N. Union Street. It is open Friday evenings until 9:00 P. M., as well as Monday through Thursday from 9:00 A. M., to 5:00 P. M. The office is no longer open to the public Saturday mornings.
