

Landowner Preference Party Permits Available

Applications for landowner-preference party permits to take an additional deer during New York's 1966 big game season must be postmarked during the six-day period Aug. 22 through Aug. 27, the State Conservation Department advised today.

State law specifies that applications for these permits may be accepted only during a six-day period.

Landowner-preference permits are available in only six of the 1966 party permit areas "D", "E", "G", "N", "S" and "W".

Area "N" in the Adirondacks includes the portions of Lewis, Jefferson and Oswego Counties known as the Tug Hill Plateau.

Areas "D", "E", "S" and "W" in the Catskill-Hudson Valley region include portions of Albany, Broome, Chenango, Columbia, Delaware, Dutchess, Greene, Orange, Otsego, Putnam, Schoharie, Sullivan and Ulster Counties.

Area "G" in western New York includes all of Chautauque and Cattaraugus Counties.

Detailed boundary descriptions, information sheets and application forms are available at all official license-issuing agencies.

At least one member of each party applying for a landowner-preference party permit must be sole or joint owner of a 50-acre, or larger, parcel of land within a single party permit area.

If the parcel is owned by a corporation, only a single representative of the corporation may apply on behalf of a party. He must attach to his application a certified copy of a resolution of the corporation's governing body. This resolution must designate him by name as the only person who may claim landowner-preference for the parcel.

Application forms must be filled in completely, and all statements of ownership of land will be checked. Notices of approval or denial will be sent to all applicants prior to the start of the big game season.

The two major causes of rejections of applications are failure to mail in applications within the specified period of time, and failure to apply for the party permit area in which the parcel of land is located.

Applicants should check and follow instructions carefully, taking special care that they apply for the specific area in which their property is located. Local Conservation Officers and regional Conservation Department officers will advise applicants on this matter.

Applications must be postmarked not earlier than Aug. 22, nor later than Aug. 27.

Under state law, no more than half of the quota of party permits in any single area may be distributed under the landowner-preference system. Applications for regular, or non-landowner-preference party permits must also be postmarked by August 27th.

September 1st Deadline For Motorcycle Licenses

Any motorcyclist who renewed his driver license after late October 1 without arranging for a special motorcycle endorsement on this license, but was qualified for one without taking a motorcycle road test, now has until September 1 to obtain the endorsement. Motor Vehicle Commissioner William S. Hulst announced the extension today.

He said those who do not take advantage of this extension will have to take the motorcycle road test at their next license renewal if they wish to operate a motorcycle in this state.

Commissioner Hulst suggested that motorcyclists contact their local Motor Vehicle office for details.

Governor Proclaims V.F.W. Week Aug. 19-26

Governor Rockefeller has proclaimed August 19-26 as "Veterans of Foreign Wars Week" to coincide with the national VFW convention in New York City and in "grateful recognition" of the organization's faithful adherence to its objectives.

His proclamation cited these objectives as:

— "To speed the rehabilitation of the nations' disabled and needy veterans;

— "To assist the widows and orphans and the dependents of disabled and needy veterans; and

— "To promote Americanism through education in patriotism and constructive service to the communities in which we live."

"These objectives, coupled with action," the Governor said, "have built the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States into a dynamic and active organization.

"As veterans, they recognize their primary responsibility is the security of our country, the protection of our citizens, and the strengthening of our American ideals. Just as they fought on the battlefields of the world, so they are continually striving for programs which are best for the public as a whole, as well as for needy and disabled veterans and their families."

Completes Air Pollution Course

R. Theodore Smith, formerly of Andover, has completed a one-week workshop on air pollution held August 7 - 12 at the Atmospheric Sciences Research Center on Whiteface Mountain in the Adirondacks. The purpose of the workshop was to bring together representatives of local government, education, industry and from interstate governmental units to familiarize them with the magnitude of the air pollution problem and its current status.

The six-day workshop, jointly sponsored by the State University of New York at Cortland, was highlighted by lectures and discussions by leaders from the New York State Air Pollution Control Board, the U.S. Public Health Service, NYS Department of Labor, and the Atmospheric Sciences Research Center.

Mr. Smith participated in discussions relative to the measurements and identification of air pollutants, the meteorological factors involved, the impact of air pollution on economics and the professions, the possible implication of Air pollution in chronic bronchitis, emphysema and lung cancer; current methods of abatement; the problems of control by local government and the roles of the federal, state and county government in air pollution abatement.

Smith is a member of the Chautauque County Board of Supervisors and an Assistant Professor at Jamestown Community College. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Smith, reside at 37 Elm Street, in Andover.

Small Businessmen May File Sales Tax On Annual Basis

Albany, August 16 — State Tax Commissioner Joseph H. Murphy announced today that an estimated 130,000 small businessman vendors in New York State now will be able to file a single annual State sales tax return instead of filing quarterly returns as they had been required to do.

The yardstick by which their choice can be made is the amount of State and local sales taxes these small businessmen are required to collect during a year. If the total tax due for the four periods ended May 31, 1966, did not exceed \$50 — and if the vendors do not expect the next year's total tax due to exceed \$50 — they may file an annual State sales tax return.

The new annual filing method was made possible today when Commissioner Murphy signed a Tax Commission regulation permitting merchants qualifying under the new \$50 procedure to begin filing annual sales tax returns with year ending May 31, 1967. This means that vendors who qualify under the new provisions, and who choose to do so, may now stop filing quarterly reports and file a single annual report by June 20, 1967, for the year ending May 31, 1967.

A second group of vendors will benefit by an amendment to the tax law, based on Commissioner Murphy's recommendation, which will require them to file annual information returns only. These vendors are required to register because they purchase for resale or sell for resale. But by the nature of their business, they are not required to collect any tax or pay any tax directly to the Tax Commission. The first such annual information return will be for the year ending May 31, 1967 and will be due June 20, 1967. Commissioner Murphy cited the retail butcher shop and the wholesale appliance distributor as examples of businesses that ordinarily would qualify.

State sales tax returns for the quarter ending August 31, 1966, are now being mailed. These returns, covering the months of June, July and August, provide space for the vendor to notify the Sales Tax Bureau in Albany that an annual return will be filed.

Commissioner Murphy stressed that all qualifying vendors who choose to file annual rather than quarterly returns should fill out the space on the face of the return labeled "Election to File Annually".

"Both groups — the vendor in the not-more-than \$50 class and the vendor in the no-tax-due class should fill out this block on the return", Commissioner Murphy said.

"Failure to fill out the block will signal our computer that sales tax vendors are still filing on a quarterly basis. They will continue to receive quarterly returns and if those returns are not filed, delinquency notices will be issued," he said.

"If you qualify, fill out the 'Election to File Annually' box. This will spare you the annoyance and inconvenience of getting tax returns you don't need, and it will enable us to administer the sales tax more efficiently", Commissioner Murphy said.

New Feature At Hamburg Fairgrounds

Why? As a result of the recent Supreme Court Decision, the lads defense attorney claimed he had not been properly informed of his rights — and away he went! Free!

Think it over — Parents — and Taxpayers! Why not try and do something about it before it happens here?

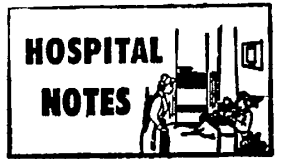
