State Issues Warning On Midwest Hay

The New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets warned farmers and hay dealers to be extremely careful when buying hay from areas in Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Illinois. Counties in these states found to be infested with the cereal leaf beetle number 193, the Department said.

Commissioner of Agriculture and Markets Don J. Wickham said, "The infested areas are under quarantine and shipments of hay, straw and grain from these points must be fumigated and certified as being beetle free." Uncertified material being shipped from beetle infested areas may be seized and destroyed in accordance with plant pest laws.

"Don't take a chance," he warned. "Be sure the hay or straw you buy comes from non-infested areas or is properly certified as beetle free."

Commissioner Wickham advised farmers to check with their County Extension Agents on beetle infested areas before buying hay or straw in any of the four states.

The cereal leaf beetle attacks small grain fields, certain grasses and occasionally young corn, according to Henry L. Page, Director of the Department's Division of Plant Industry. Crop loss can run as high as 25 to 50 percent in infested fields, he added. The insect was discovered in Michigan in 1962 and has been moving eastward at a rapid pace since then.

Robert L. Coulter County Red Cross Fund Chairman

Naval Reserve Courses Offered For Officers

The Commanding Officer of the Naval Reserve Officer School located in Buffalo, New York, today announced the courses to be offered at the school for the coming year, and reminded all Naval Reserve Officers of the excellent opportunity offered them by the school.

Cmdr. John G. Putnam, Jr., Commanding Officer of NROS 2-4, said that courses would be offered to all Naval Reserve Officers in the following subjects: Basic Engineering, Navigation, Naval Intelligence, Oceanography, Counter Insurgency and Cold War Strategy.

Completion of courses earns for the officer a "satisfactory federal year" for retirement purposes, and also allows him to advance both technically and professionally as a naval reservist.

The school conducts its courses each Thursday evening from 8 to 10 P. M., with registration to be held the first Thursday after Labor Day; classes continue through the end of June. The school is conducted at the Naval Reserve Training Center at the foot of Porter Avenue in Buffalo.

Last year over 50 Naval Officers from the Western New York area attended courses at the school.

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Party Permit Deadline August 27th

Applications for party permits to take an additional deposit either sex during New York's 1966 big game season must be post-marked no later than August 27, the State Conservation Department today advised sportsmen.

Approximately 60,000 applications have been received so far.

Early applicants have no advantage over those applying at the last minute. Computers will approve or deny applications by random selection in areas where the number of applicants exceeds the established quotas of permits.

Sportsmen may still secure permits on forms and information sheets from local license-issuing agents. The information sheets explain how to apply, describe the boundaries of the party permit areas, and show these boundaries on maps.

Hunters are advised to follow these instructions carefully, and to double-check their applications for accuracy and completeness before mailing them. And they are reminded that applications must be post-marked no later than August 27.
