Ground Broken For New Local Mausoleum

Ground was broken today for the foundation of the Charles A. Robinson Memorial Mausoleum. It will be built on a 48' x 48' lot donated for the purpose, by Rodney Robinson, directly in center and to the rear of the present Valley Brook Cemetery. The structure will be built of cement blocks faced with split stone, with outside measurements of 14' x 18'.

At a meeting of representatives of the three local cemeteries—"Gate of Heaven", "Hillside" and Valley Brook" on Tuesday evening the following were elected to be directors of "The Charles A. Robinson Memorial Mausoleum Fund: Con Casey, President, 3 years

Gerald Hann, Vice-President, 2 years
Reid Mattison, Treasurer

More money is needed to complete the project and will be solicited by those previously delegated to collect funds. \$900.00 has been collected out of an estimated need for \$1,200.00. It is expected that each Cemetery will agree to pay \$20.00 annually to maintain the grounds and make any repairs or improvements needed. Donations can be left at the Bank.

Due to the lateness of the season it was decided to start construction at once before the winter season arrives.

Investigators Solve Local Burglary

According to information received, State Police Investigators Richard Tobin, and Raymond Slade, have made positive identification of the suspect alleged to be involved in the burglary at the Andover Village Garage and store-room.

After a great deal of painstaking investigation, the two BCI Officers were able to "lift" a latent fingerprint left at the scene of the crime. This print was then turned over to the crime lab for classification, comparison and identification.

Then with the co-operation and help of other Police Officers in this area, the two State Investigators were able to give the crime lab enough information so that they could begin their time-consuming comparisons.

The Fingerprint Experts at the crime lab assigned to the case worked for many hours and finally discovered that they had a "triple overlay" print. Once this was established, many more hours of careful, detailed comparisons were necessary before enough similar points were found to make a positive identification.

As soon as the identity of the suspect was established, a warrant for his arrest was secured and State Police are hopeful of apprehending him in the near future to stand trial.

At the present time, some of the stolen property has been recovered and search is being continued for the remaining stolen items.
