During all this commotion, Chuck Wright, No. 66, moved out into the lead which he kept for the rest of the race with Dick Bunn, No. 69, moving into the No. 2 slot and trying his best to catch him.

In the Modern Class, Ray Kent, No. 23, had the right side of his car cleaned off in a scrape with another car — but still came back to win the "Consy" and finish 2nd in the Feature.

The highlight of the Feature happened when the race was a little more than half way thru as Darryl Dennis, No. 243, apparently lost control in the No. 3 turn and flipped up on the left side of his car crosswise the track and right in the "groove" with Don Buchanan, No. 11X, and several other cars bearing down on him. The top of No. 243 was facing the onrushing cars and if Don hadn't thrown his car into a quick spin and turned around, sliding backward into the overturned car — Darryl would undoubtedly have been injured seriously. As it was, he was able to climb out apparently uninjured as soon as the race was stopped. The other approaching drivers, taking their cue from Buchanan's quick action, also spun their cars around so that there wasn't any big pile-up.

At the re-start, Paul Hidek, No. 67, who had been out in the lead from fairly early in the race, naturally started in the No. 1 slot; with No. 18, 2nd; Warren Kinney, No. 16, 3rd; and the other cars lined up "Indian Fashion" in back. After leading for a couple of laps, Paul apparently started to have trouble with his car and a couple of cars passed him on the backstretch — and then more events began to happen.

Apparently, the oil that had poured out of No. 243 when it wrenched on its side had left a slippery spot in the middle of the track between the No. 3 and No. 4 turn, so that most of the drivers were having problems getting thru and finally Bill Hall, No. 21, spun out completely in the No. 4 turn directly in front of Paul — and he plowed into the stalled car. Before Paul could get his car out of the way, another car, No. 11X, and when he finally got going we noticed that something was wrong

with his left front wheel which forced him to pull out of the race. By this time, Bob Gee, No. 260, had managed to pull out into the No. 1 slot and came on in to pick up the "Chekker", with Ray Kent No. 28, following close behind.

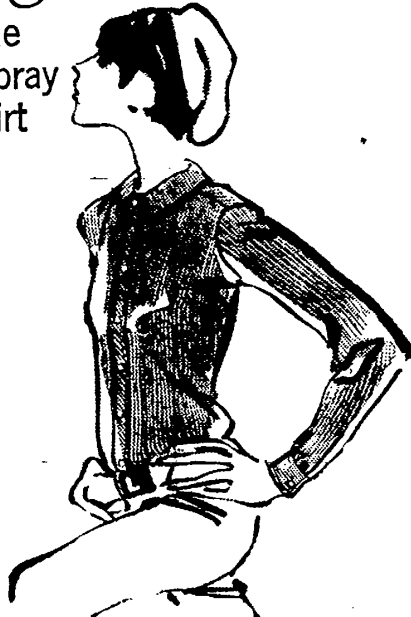
