**New Vehicle Inspection Schedule Announced By Comm. Of Motor Vehicles**

Owners of cars less than five years old were urged to have them inspected as soon as possible to avoid possible delays at State-licensed inspection stations at the end of this year.

Motor Vehicle Commissioner William S. Hults pointed out that under an amendment to the Inspection Law, made by the 1966 Legislature and effective October 1, nearly all motor vehicles must now be inspected once every 12 months.

"During the 10 months ahead," the Commissioner said, "a transition schedule will be followed for most older vehicles now under the program. However, owners whose vehicles never before have been included under the law may have them inspected anytime before their next registration renewal.

"After this first inspection," he continued, "owners may select the month in which it will be most convenient for them to have the job done, just so long as it is within 12 months since the previous inspection. Also, the next inspection must have been performed previous to renewal time for the vehicle's future registration."

The transition inspection schedule for older vehicles:

**1959 and older models** — Must be inspected according to the schedule printed on the back of their present inspection stickers.

**1960 models** — Must be inspected during October, regardless of when their registrations are due for renewal.

**1961 models** — Registrations expiring in October 1966 may be inspected anytime between now and next April; inspection will not be necessary for registration renewal. Registrations expiring after October 1966 must be inspected during either October or November 1966, before the registration will be renewed.

**1962 and newer models** — Registrations expiring in October and November 1966 will not require inspection to renew but must be inspected in the Spring as follows:

1962 and 1963 models, April 1964 models, May; 1965 models, June; 1966 and 1967 models, July. These vehicles may be inspected

"Vehicle owners who are uncertain about when to have their cars inspected may inquire at any of the 10,000 inspection stations located throughout the State, or at any Motor Vehicle office," he explained.
