



Dr. Finla G. Crawford

Local Candidate For Delegate To Convention

Dr. Finla G. Crawford of Andover is an endorsed candidate for nomination as a Constitutional Convention delegate from Allegany County.

County voters interested in quality of convention delegates, and certainly they should be interested, are fortunate because in the November General Election they can cast votes for any three of six candidates.

By agreement, each of the parties is selecting its three candidates from the 57th Senatorial District on a one-per-county basis, so there will be one Republican and one Democratic candidate from each of the three counties—Allegany, Cattaraugus and Chautauqua, although the winners will be decided by the district-wide totals.

Dr. Crawford is a well qualified candidate as evidenced by his selection to serve as one of the five trustees of the vast, powerful and complex New York State Power Authority by Governor Harriman. As a confirmation of his abilities, he was the only Democrat ever reappointed to that board by Republican Governor Rockefeller.

Further proof of Dr. Crawford's capabilities was shown by his selection as chairman of the board of trustees of Alfred University, and the constant calls he receives to serve as advisor and consultant for Colleges and Universities throughout the country.

Mr. Crawford went to Syracuse University in 1919 as a teacher of political science and administration and remained active as a teacher until a few years before his retirement as Vice Chancellor of the University.

During his teaching career, he served as Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and chairman of the department of political science from 1938 to 1942, when he became Vice Chancellor, the post he held until his retirement in 1959.

Thus, on the practical side of government, Dr. Crawford has both the education and experience in the ideal areas to make him a top candidate for nomination as a delegate to the forthcoming Constitutional Convention.

As far as this Newspaper is concerned, we heartily endorse Dr. Finla Crawford as a candidate for this post together with Burdette Hasper, Republican Candidate from Allegany County; and J. Murdoch Dawley, Professor of Political Science, State University of Fredonia, and author of the current series of informational articles which appear on our Editorial page.

Permanent Small Game Licenses For Senior Citizens

Free, permanent small game licenses will be available to senior citizens — persons 70 years of age or older — about Sept. 15th, the State Conservation Department has announced.

Last year these free hunting licenses were available for the first time. Actually, issuing clerks took regular 1965-66 small game season licenses and marked them "free" for 13,214 senior citizens. This year the Department removed the need for further annual visits to issuing clerks by preparing permanent licenses which need not be renewed.

An applicant for a permanent free hunting license must be a citizen and a resident of New York State. When he visits his local license-issuing agent, he should bring along both proof of age and proof that he has previously held a New York State hunting license, or that he completed a hunting safety training course.

The Conservation Department emphasized that no big game licenses are issued free of charge.

In a recent news item that appeared in the Buffalo Evening News, our attention has been called to the fact that a former Andover Man has been elected to the position of Vice President in a Buffalo Firm.

According to the News Item, James S. Witter has been elected to this position from the Refrigeration Division of the Mollenberg-Betz Machine Co., which does a \$4 million-a-year business on a nationwide scale and employs 110 persons in two Buffalo plants.

Nice going "Jimmy".

According to a recent release from the Office of Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz, a warning has been issued to families, that signing a contract for a "money-saving" food and freezer plan may actually be an extremely expensive and heart-breaking transaction.

"No matter what the salesman at the door tells you," the Attorney General said, "You are not being given that freezer free of charge! In fact, in addition to your regular installment payments, there will be service charges, interest rates, life and damage insurance fees, and possibly other hidden costs, bringing the total you pay up to three times the original price quoted."

He particularly emphasized that the freezer contracts, after signing by consumers, are sold to sales finance companies whose function is simply to collect payments without being in any way equipped to answer complaints about the quality or cost of the food and the high price of the freezer.

Consumers were urged by the Attorney General that, when approached to enlist in such a plan, they should under no circumstances sign a contract the first time the salesman appears at the door. Instead, they should insist that the contract be left for their consideration, and then seek advice from the "Better Business Bureau", "Chamber of Commerce", or from the Bureau of Consumer Fraud and Protection in the office of the Attorney General.
