According to Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz, another high pressure "referral Sales" scheme which took more than \$300,000 from consumers who paid up to six times the value of household appliances has been brought to justice with the New York Supreme Court granting an injunction against two corporations and six individuals.

Labeling the scheme as a "gold plated" reception, a "public nuisance" and a "public fraud", Supreme Court Justice Ryman Korn ordered the firms and individuals to stop their fraudulent and illegal practices.

Attorney General Lefkowitz charged in his petition that the companies had cheated as much as \$900 for a "simile home kitchen broiler" and more than \$1,500 for a color television set and nearly \$1,000 for a vacuum cleaner.

The Attorney General charged that many persons of limited incomes were the prey of the promoters of the scheme which was disguised as a "money making" venture for consumers who were contacted by salesmen of the firms.

The "referral sales" scheme works like this: Salesmen call on consumers and tell them that they can participate in a "money making" advertising scheme by acquiring one of the appliances and referring friends and relatives as prospective "enrollers" in the plan. The consumers were promised a \$50 commission for each referral. All the consumer had to do was permit the appliance or TV set to be installed in his home.

The consumer signed separate documents consisting of a commission agreement, a credit statement, an installation order, and the installment contract. In all cases, the appliance was delivered immediately and the installment contract alone was promptly turned over to a finance company.

Does this sound kind of familiar? YEP, BEWARE, of what you sign!
