The local Post Office and Rural Carrier's boxes last week received a Zip Code form card in which the patrons were asked to write down out-of-town addresses and the Post Office will supply you with the correct Zip Code Numbers. Please ask for more form cards if you

want to help Mr. Zip and his Little Digits.
