Citizens of Andover are invited to participate in the observance of Veterans Day, Friday, November 11th, sponsored by the Lynch-Burgett Post No. 397 of the American Legion.

The parade will form at the Legion Home at 10:45 a. m., and march down Main Street to the Legion Park, where services will be held with the Rev. Willis Poole as guest speaker.
