National Merit Scholarship Tests

Andover Central School, Junior students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1968 can register now to participate in the 1967-68 National Merit Scholarship Program, Principal James H. Kessler has announced.

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT), which will be given in the school at 9:00 a. m., Saturday, February 25.

Participating students pay a \$1 fee, which is remitted by the school to Science Research Associates (SRA), the testing agency.

In addition to competing for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1968, students can take the test to obtain information useful in planning their future education and careers. With his NMSQT scores, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his score, compare his performance with that of other high school students across the country, and give him information on choosing a college and financing his education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the National Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC, more than 350 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 13,440 students have won Merit Scholarships in the eleven Merit Programs to date. Some 2330 Merit Scholarships were awarded in 1965 with stipends ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 per year for four college years. The
