National Merit Scholarship Tests

Andover Central School, Junior students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1968 can register now to participate in the 19.7-68 National Merit Scholarship Program, Principal James H. Kessler has announced.

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT), which will be given in the school at 9:00 a. m., Saturday, February 25.

Participating students pay a \$1 fee, which is remitted by the school to Science Research Associ-

school to Science Research Associates (SRA), the testing agency.

In addition to connetting for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1968, students can take the test to obtain information useful in planning their future education and careers. With his NMSQT scores, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his score, compare his performance with that of other high school students across the country, and give him information on choosing a college and financing his education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.


