

Legion Auxiliary Starts Fund Drive For New Equip.

The American Legion Auxiliary of Lynch-Burgett Post No. 397 recently announced that they plan to earn enough money through several projects so that they will be able to purchase a new wheel chair and perhaps some other much needed equipment.

The local Auxiliary Chapter has maintained a program of furnishing Hospital Equipment for local residents when ever it was needed as a free Public Service for many years. This includes wheel chairs, crutches, canes, hospital beds, etc., which deteriorate and wear out over a period of time.

It is doubtful if the general public realizes how expensive it is to maintain this type of equipment — or purchase new items. For example, the new wheel chair that has been ordered by the Auxiliary costs in the vicinity of \$100 and of course, larger pieces of equipment cost just that much more.

The Chairman of the Rehabilitation Committee tells us that they have loaned the following items free of charge to local residents during the past year:

- Crutches — 9 times
 - Hospital Beds — 2 times
 - Wheel Chairs — 4 times
 - Walkers — 3 times
 - Canes — 3 times
 - Commodore — 4 times
- Thus if you help the Auxiliary, you may be helping yourself sometime.

To those of you who would like to help the Postmaster, Clerks and Rural Carriers, we offer the following suggestions:

Unsealed greeting cards without writing, other than name signed may be mailed for us, but they can not be forwarded or returned if undeliverable as addressed. Those bearing First Class Letter Rate can be forwarded or returned if return address and Zip Code No. 14806 (Andover) is on the envelope.

Certified Mail Service 30c plus 10c for return receipt provides record of delivery at the office of address. Valuable mail or documents should be Registered.

Would you please Pack Well. Wrap with heavy paper, and Tie with String your packages to be mailed and address plainly on just one side with Zip Code if possible? It is also advised to write address on package as sometimes parcel post labels loosen from package.

We appreciate you separating your letters and greeting cards for Local and Out-of-Town delivery and leave in either Money Order or Stamp Window. The Rural Route Patrons will receive a POD Form Stamp Stock Purchase Request for ordering. Your carrier will have a supply of stamps, envelopes and post cards to fill the orders. Patrons are expected to affix stamps to their Letter Mail and Greeting Cards before placing in their rural boxes for collection by the Rural Route Carrier.

Effective Dec 15 thru Dec. 23 the Post Office Hours will be from 8 a. m. to 5:30 p. m., Hours on Dec. 24th, 8 p. m. to Noon. There will be no service on Dec. 25th, and the office will be closed Mon. Dec. 26th according to Holiday regulations.

- 2nd dose of Triple and Double Toxoid
- Booster of Double Toxoid
- 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and Booster of Polio Vaccine
- Smallpox Vaccination

All immunizations should be repeated at five year intervals during childhood. If this has not been done, please do so by Jan. 1, 1967 as a new law is being passed at that time that will enforce immunization of school age children.

All pre-school children must be at the school not later than 9:15 A. M. If you have not contacted Mrs. Dodge, Nurse-Teacher, in regards to immunization — please do so before Monday, Dec. 5th as the vaccine must be ordered before date of clinic.
