Yep, the temperature has varied over 70 degrees on the home front here in Andover over the past week — and if that doesn't qualify local Thermometers for a good "Yo-Yo" contest — nothing will!

On our recent trip back from the "Sunny South", it rained all the way in from Alexandria, Va. (Nov. 26th) until we hit Addison. Then — it started to snow!

The Medical Center consists of a 15x30 waiting room; glassed in Business Office; 2 examining rooms; Pediatric room; lab; and Doctors Office.

An OPEN HOUSE will be held Sunday, Dec. 11th, from 2 - 4 p. m., with the public invited to come in and look over the new Medical Center and meet the Doctor who will be operating it.
