Smoking and Coronary Artery Disease

A recent, brief article in the New York Times should be of particular interest to women. It is becoming obvious that the ratio of widows to widowers in our population is shifting. Our life expectancy tables usually indicate an additional five-year prolonged span for the female of the species, as compared to the male. This disparity is largely due to the prevalence and malignancy of vascular disease in the male, as compared to the female. The chief offender is coronary artery disease which rarely occurs below the age of 50 in females, unless they have hypertension, or diabetes, or some other predisposing condition.

Now the Times quotes the Office of Health Economics, a most reputable private organization in London, which states that heavy smoking more than doubles the risk of coronary disease. The report indicated that this year there would be 6,000 new widows below the age of 50. There are 500,000 widows in Britain today who have lost their husbands through heart disease.

The report goes on to say that a person who smokes as many as two packs of cigarettes per day more than doubles his risk of developing coronary disease.

Similarly, a report from the American Cancer Society, by Dr. Cuyler Hammond, showed that in this country the death rate from coronary heart disease is 2.8 times that of nonsmokers. For those men who smoke more than

two packs a day, the death rate is 3.35 that of nonsmokers. The study also made an interesting comment on women smokers who, by smoking, doubled their heart disease incidence.

So much attention has been focused on the relationship between smoking and lung disease and cancer that perhaps now we shall have more exhaustive studies on the vascular disease-tobacco link.

Medically, we know that in a certain disorder involving the smaller arteries of the feet and hands, popularly known as Buerger's disease, the continuation of smoking aggravates and causes further progression of the vascular condition. When smoking is curtailed, the vascular problem abates. Other clinical evidence of the relationship of heart disease and tobacco in excessive smokers is the occurrence of anginal or chest pain in heavy smokers.

Sound medical advice to those potential vascular disease males who are obese, hypertensive, diabetic, have high blood lipids or fats, and who are predisposed to physical inactivity and mental tension, would certainly be to stop smoking. That the same advice should be given to women below the age of 50 is logical, but perhaps not as imperative as it is for men. Certainly, the same precautions should be taken for the female over the age of 60, when the incidence of coronary artery disease becomes the same as for the male.



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
