Senior Interview

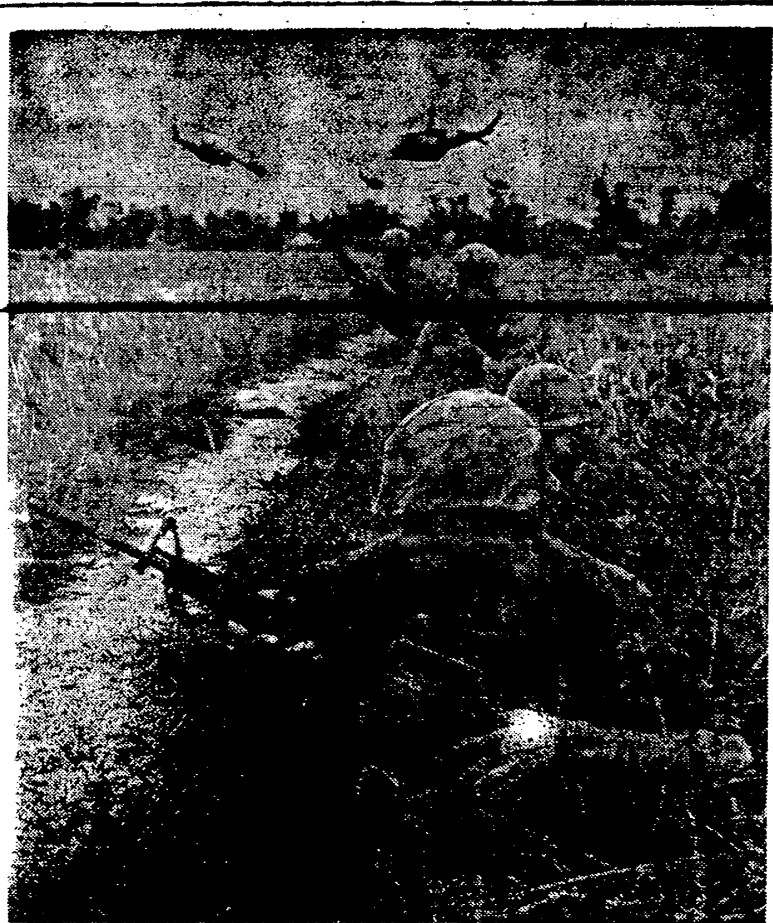

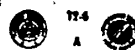
When Fred has completed his high school education, he plans to enroll in the Ceramics Course at Alfred University.



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
