The required procedures for Towns and Villages to receive Federal and State Aid for needed projects such as water and sewar control and others, were presented by Mr. McNight.

It was stressed that a region of geographical area must have completed certain requirements before they would be considered challe for Federal and State Aid.

One such requirement is, that said area must complete a comprehensive study in three specific areas: land use, transportation, and community facilities.

The overall picture of the "comprehensive Plan" was presented by the Planming Commission to the Village Board and was discussed. The Village Board and was discussed. The Village Board requested that the Planning Commission continue meeting with the representatives of the State Of fice of Planning Coordination, and that they gain as much information as possible concerning Federal and State Aid program to help meet our needs here in Andover.
