Representing the Andover Town Board were: Erwin Lewis, Harold Sisson, George Mickle, and Harry Kemp; with Supervisor, Leonard Briggs, not present. Mrs. Merle Dibble, Town Clerk, was also in attendance.

Merle Fox, Fire Chief, and seven other members of the Andover Fire Department were also present representing the newly formed Rescue Squad.

With no one appearing to voice an objection to the Proposition, the Public Hearing was officially closed at 9:00 p. m. and a resolution from both Boards was passed accepting the proposed contract as advertised and authorizing Mayor Kilbane and Supervisor Briggs to sign it.

New Planning Commission Meets With Village Board

This past Tuesday evening, January 24, 1967, the Village Planning Commission met with the Andover Village Board in a special session following the Ambulance Hearing.

The purpose of the meeting was for the Planning Commission to inform the Village Board of the information gained at a meeting on the 17th of January with Mr. George McNight at Wellsville. Mr. McNight is from the State Office of Planning Co-ordination in Buffalo.

This meeting was held jointly with the Village and Town Planning Boards of Scio, Almond, Wellsville, Wellington and Andover.

The required procedures for Towns and Villages to receive Federal and State Aid for needed projects such as water and sewer control and others, were presented by Mr. McNight.

It was stressed that a regional geographical area must have completed certain requirements before they would be considered eligible for Federal and State Aid.

One such requirement is, that said area must complete a comprehensive study in three specific areas: land use, transportation, and community facilities.

The overall picture of the "Comprehensive Plan" was presented by the Planning Commission to the Village Board and was discussed. The Village Board requested that the Planning Commission continue meeting with the representatives of the State Office of Planning Co-ordination, and that they gain as much information as possible concerning Federal and State Aid programs to help meet our needs here in Andover.

The Village Planning Commission consists of: Fay Royd; Leon Coffin; Noel Hazzard; Philip MacMichael; and Willis V. Poole, Chairman.
