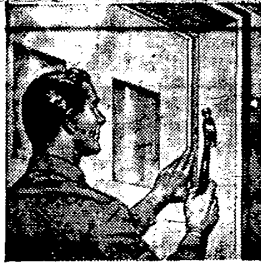
Tax Notice

Financial records are important in preparing your Federal income tax return, John E. Foley, District Director of Internal Revenue, reminded taxpayers today.

With the filing season beginning on January 1, now is the time to get these records together. The tax official said that cancelled checks, receipts, records of con-

tributions, and other papers would all be helpful.

Taxpayers who keep good financial records during the year will find it easier to prepare their Federal income tax returns. Complete records are especially important to taxpayers who itemize deductions.

Copies of prior years' returns are good guides in preparing the new return, Mr. Foley reminded.
