The Andover Town and Village Boards met in a special joint session on Sunday, January 29th to approve the purchase of a 1958 Cadillac. Ambulance from the Superior Coach and Equipment Co., Inc., of Rochester, -N. Y.

The ambulance was delivered on Saturday for inspection by the Voluntier Ambulance Corps of the Andover Fire Department, members of the town and village boards and any other interested rarties. After inspection of the ambulance the consensus of opinions was that it would be a good and reasonable purchase for 22,195.00. The purchase price includes three cots, all of the required emergency lights, flashers and siren equipment. Medical supplies, portable resuscitator and two-way radio equipment were not included and will be purchased to meet the present requirements. The village and town board have been invited to meet with the firemen and the board of trustees of the Fire Department at their
