Emergency Blood Run Made For Wellsville Hospital

Feb. 1, Wellsville — An emergency "Blood Run" was made around 8:00 p. m., Wednesday evening by the Allegany County Radio Emergency Service for a bleeding ulcer patient at the Jones Memorial Hospital.

The "Run" was made on an emergency basis with the Police Department from Hornell, Andover and Wellsville furnishing Police Escorts thru their respective townships.

According to Howard Bergerson, Wellsville, who served as President of the organization for a 2-year term from 1965 - 1966, members have been making "Blood Runs" for the Jones Memorial Hospital as a Public Service since April, 1966.

During this short span, they have transported over 300 pints of blood, mostly from Bethesda Hospital in Hornell, to the Jones Memorial Hospital in Wellsville.

So far, members of the association have compiled an almost unbelievable safety record. According to their records, they have travelled over 7,000 miles without an accident and have never lost a pint of blood in any manner either thru transportation or handling.

Victor Grover, from Wellsville is the present President having taken office as of January 1st.

Town And Village Boards Purchase Ambulance

The Andover Town and Village Boards met in a special joint session on Sunday, January 29th to approve the purchase of a 1958 Cadillac Ambulance from the Superior Coach and Equipment Co., Inc., of Rochester, N. Y.

The ambulance was delivered on Saturday for inspection by the Volunteer Ambulance Corps of the Andover Fire Department, members of the town and village boards and any other interested parties. After inspection of the ambulance the consensus of opinion was that it would be a good and reasonable purchase for \$2,195.00. The purchase price includes three cots, all of the required emergency lights, flashers and siren equipment. Medical supplies, portable resuscitator and two-way radio equipment were not included and will be purchased to meet the present requirements.

The village and town board have been invited to meet with the firemen and the board of trustees of the Fire Department at their next regular meeting, next Tuesday, to complete the plans for the operation, storage and maintenance of the ambulance.
