Earl C. Bassett

The following was taken from the Lockport, Union-Sun and Journal —

Earl C. Bassett, 74, of 250 Genesee St., Lockport, founder of the Bassett Travel Agency, died this morning, January 20, 1967, at Mount View Hospital after a short illness.

He was the husband of the former, Winifred Porter, who survives him. The couple was married in 1915.

Mr. Bassett was referred to as Lockport's "elder statesman" of transportation at the time he sold the agency in December, 1959 to Lawrence H. Schultz of Batavia, who has since sold it to Ralph A. Weeks and his son, Roger, both of Lockport.

Mr. Bassett began his transportation career in 1920 as a clerk in the Erie Railroad office in Buffalo. He joined the International Railway Co., and the Gorge Railway in 1926, as a travel passenger agent. He later became general passenger agent and continued in that capacity until 1959 when the Niagara Gorge line was abandoned.

He joined the Central Greyhound Lines as a travel passenger agent the same year. Part of his territory was the route between Buffalo, Lockport and Rochester.

In 1941, he resigned to open the Bassett Travel Agency at 29 Main St., Lockport. His activity centered mainly in serving the Greyhound Lines and the Postal Telegraph Co. The store was burned out Nov. 12, 1949, and the business was moved to temporary quarters made available by the Lockport Bus Lines and Ridge Road Express.

Mr. Bassett operated the former bus station and terminal, between Pearl and Walnut Streets from August, 1950 until his retirement. The business expanded to include not only other bus lines, but all types of transportation and the booking of hotel, motor car and resort facilities.

The building was demolished last year to expand the Pearl Street city parking lot and a new building erected a half block away.

He was a member of the International Air Traffic Conference, Transatlantic and Trans-Pacific Passenger Conference, Western Hemisphere Conference, Air Traffic Conference of America, Rail Traffic Promotion Agency, American Society of Travel of the Buffalo Passenger Association.

Besides his widow, he is survived by one brother John Chandler of Buffalo.

Burial was in Hillside Cemetery, Andover.

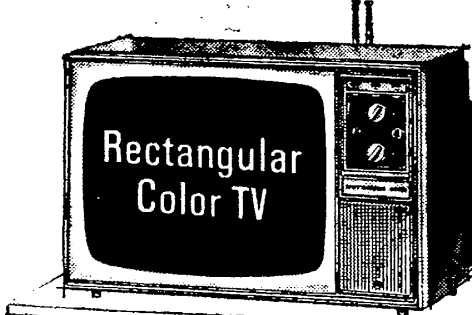

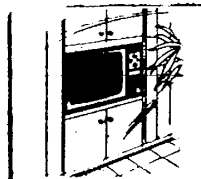

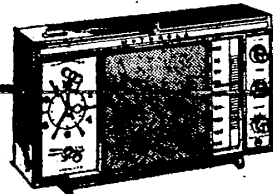
