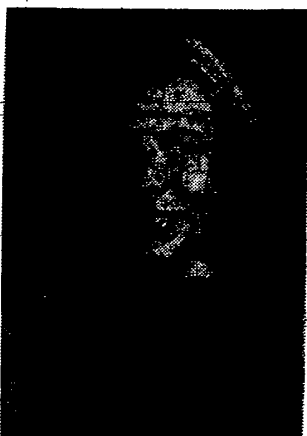

Eight Andover Seniors Win Scholarship Awards

From a graduating class of thirty-six, eight Seniors or approximately twenty-two percent of the class have won either New York State Regents, or Nursing Scholarships, or Special Scholarships.

The New York State Education Department announced on Feb. 16, 1967, the names of those high school pupils who have won Regents Scholarship awards.

The Regents Scholarship Examination for these scholarships was written by approximately 160,000 high school seniors in about 1,200 secondary schools of the State on October 4, 1966.

There are a total of 18,743 Regents College Scholarships awarded each year.

The number allocated to each county is determined by the ratio of the number of high school graduates in each county to the total number of high school graduates in the State last year.

Allagany County received 61 Scholarships, with Dale R. Angood, 52 Greenway St., Andover, being 4th highest in the County with a score of 250.

The holder of one of these scholarships will be entitled to an

annual award of \$250 to \$1,000, depending on financial need, for each of four years of his college course while attending any college in the State of New York approved by the Regents for this purpose.

In addition, scholarship holders may be eligible to receive scholarship incentive awards of \$100 to \$500 up to the cost of tuition.

The following are the names of Andover Central School who received these scholarships are listed alphabetically:

Dale R. Angood, Mary F. DeRemer, Rita E. Dixon, Connie L. Lewis, David H. Peckham, Camilla A. Wallace.

Dale Angood, who was among the top five in Allagany County, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Angood. His plans for the future are indefinite at the present time.

Mary DeRemer, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald DeRemer, plans to attend St. Bonaventure majoring in Chemistry.

Rita Dixon, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Dixon, will major in Spanish at Niagara University.

Connie Lewis, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Gavin, has a New York State Regents Scholarship and a Nursing Scholarship.

She has been accepted at the State University of New York at Plattsburgh in the Liberal Arts Program.

David Peckham, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Peckham, will study Business Administration at Ithaca College or enroll in the Liberal Arts Program at Colgate.

Camilla Wallace, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Wallace, has been accepted in the school of X-Ray Technology at Strong Memorial Hospital.

Also announced at the same time are the names of the 600 high school pupils to whom Regents Scholarships for Basic Professional Education in Nursing have been awarded as a result of a competitive examination held October 4, 1966. There are listed to the pupils of each county, four times as many scholarships as there are Assembly Districts in the County.

The holder of one of these scholarships will be entitled to an annual award of \$200 to \$500 a year, depending on financial need for each year of study in a registered professional nursing course.

There were 2 of these scholarships awarded in Allagany County under Group A, with Connie L. Lewis, Andover Central School, receiving one which is valid for a maximum of four years at any recognized school of nursing in New York State.

In addition to the above scholarships, the State Education Department also announced the names of 600 winners of the 1967 Special New York State Scholarships provided for children of deceased or disabled members of the Armed Forces of the United States.

These special scholarships entitle the holders to \$450 a year for the next four years in an approved college or university located within New York State selected by the scholarship winner.

Duania L. Geer, Andover Central School, was the recipient of one of these scholarships. Miss Geer, the daughter of Mrs. Shirley Geer, is enrolled in the Nursing School at St. James Hospital in Henrieville.

Marguerite Rick, Andover Central School, the daughter of Mrs. Ella Rick, has been named as an alternate for a Nursing Scholarship. She has been accepted in the school of X-Ray Technology at the Harrisburg Hospital.
