A Massachusetts truck driver lost part of his left leg Monday after his tractor-trailer plunged off Route 21 at Alfred Station. Frederick J. Putnam, 39, was thrown from the truck and pinned under a wheel for more than an hour. His leg later was amputated just below the knee at the Bethesda Hospital where he was reported in "satisfactory" condition Tuesday morning.

As it plunged down an embankment the truck sheared off a utility pole, disrupting power for nearly two hours in Alfred and for seven hours in Alfred Station and Almond.

Being thrown from the truck may have saved Putnam's life. The splintered end of the utility pole stabbed through the bottom of the cab and the driver's seat.

The accident happened at 3:20 p. m. as Putnam, driving north on Route 21, tried to avoid an MG sports car which had pulled onto the road from Route 244. The tractor-trailer struck the rear of the car, driven by Alfred University student Michael Mann, 19, of Bradford, Pa., and knocked it 100 yards down the road. Mann was uninjured.
