Pearl Moore Tuttle, resident of Andover since 1929 and the widow of Philo K. Tuttle, died Friday, February 24, 1967 at Mary's Nursing Home in Wellsville. She was a former teacher.

Born Dec. 12, 1881, in Hornell, Mrs. Tuttle was a daughter of James C. and Kansas Whiting Moore. She had taught in Howard, Hornell and Rochester, N. Y., and in Youngstown, O., and had also resided in Wellsville. Following the death of her husband in 1938 she continued to operate Tuttle's Variety Store in Andover until the early 1940's. She was also for many years a volunteer librarian at Andover Free Library.

Mrs. Tuttle was a member of the Andover Methodist Church and of its Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Surviving are two sons, Roger Tuttle and Alan Tuttle, both of Andover; a sister, Miss Margaret Moore of Winona, Minn., four grandchildren; and an aunt, Mr. Gertrude Whiting Johnson of Hornell.

Funeral services were held at the home of her son, Roger Tuttle, 214 Dyke Street, Sunday at 2 p. m. The Rev. Gerald Wolters, pastor of the Andover Methodist Church officiated. Burial was in Hillside Cemetery.

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of the James B. Mulholland Funeral Home, Andover.

Bernard Burger, Avery R. Mead and Dr. Finla Crawford were then nominated and elected as the Committee to fill vacancies.

Williams Store Scene of Daring Daylight Burglary

The H. H. Williams Store was the scene of a daring daylight burglary last Friday afternoon with the thieves taking nearly \$1,000 in cash from the unlocked safe.

It is believed that the burglary took place between 1:00 and 1:30 p. m. but the loss of the money wasn't discovered until around 3:05 p. m. when a store employee went to make change.

Police Chief Ray Witter was immediately notified, and after arriving at the scene, was told by the two members of the firm present during the time the money was believed stolen, that an unknown man and woman had been in the store during this period.

They reported that the woman distracted the attention of one of them in a different part of the store while the other clerk was busy waiting on a regular customer, and that the strange man was ostentatiously looking over a winter jacket in the vicinity of the location of the unlocked safe, which gave him an opportunity to remove the missing money.

The money had been checked late that morning by store Officials and included 60 two dollar bills; \$650 in ten dollar bills; \$55 in five dollar bills; and \$50 in one dollar bills. Thus it is believed by the store owners that the total amount stolen was close to \$1,000.

Chief Witter was given the following description of the unknown couple: the man was described as around 40 years old, with brown hair, a full face, and receding chin. The woman was around 5 feet 8 inches tall, with dark skin and brown hair, was wearing a grayish-green coarse wool coat and hat, and appeared to be between 35 to 40 years old. Witter also reported that a late model car with Ohio license plates was parked near the store about the same time.

Several of the two dollar bills had serial numbers in sequence, but the numbers were not disclosed at the time of the robbery. Investigation and possible identification is continuing.

Burglars Hit State Highway Building

Burglars entered the State Highway Garage Building in Andover some time early Sunday morning after the crew left at midnight on their night detail stealing a box of tools and sealed beam headlights valued in the vicinity of \$60.

It is believed that entrance was gained through an unlocked door in the building, according to Investigator R. A. Tobin of the Wellsville State Police sub-station who was called to the scene and is continuing the investigation.

In another area burglary reported Tuesday morning, Burglars stole around \$150 in cash from a safe located in the principal's office in the Jasper Central School. The thieves entered the building by ripping down a temporary plywood partition separating the main building from a construction project.

They then forced open the office door and proceeded to tear the door off the safe with what Steuben County Sheriff's Officials think was a crowbar.

Investigation is continuing under the supervision of under-sheriff Jack Lisi assisted by deputies Robert Chura and Vernon Peck.
