The H. H. Williams Store was the scene of a daring daylight burgiary last Friday afternoon with the thieves taking nearly \$1,000 in cash from the unlocked

Police Chief Ray Witter was immediatly notified, and after arriving at the scene, was told by the two members of the firm present during the time the money
