Pinecrest Poultry Farm Initiates New Service

A new Serve-Yourself Service is being introduced by Robert Tomm, Prop. of the Pinecrest Poultry Farm at Tip Top this week.

A small new building has been erected in front of the regular sales room and the packages of eggs will be located in a large refrigerator. They will be put up in individual clear plastic bag packages selling for a dollar and will contain a stated amount of eggs in each package, depending on the graded size of the eggs.

By using this new type of package, not only is there around 10% saving between the cost of the plastic bag and regular egg cartons — which is passed along to the customer, but it also gives people a chance to "see what they are buying."

Curiously enough, with this new type of packaging, the cost of eggs figures out to a little less than 30c a pound — which is certainly a reasonable amount for a good quality meat substitute.

Also, as part of the modern processing of eggs to keep "up-with-the-times", Robert Tomm, proprietor, tells us that he has just recently installed a new "Aquamagic" egg processing machine at a cost of nearly \$4,000 which cleans the eggs with sanitizing action, candies them, and then grades them in one continuous process.

By using this new machine, only 2 people are needed for the whole process which, when operating at peak performance, can handle 4,320 eggs per hour.

Another interesting thing about the Poultry Farm is that it is a "Family Operation" with Robert Jr., 15; Steve, 13; Laurie, 11; Cindy, 9; and Denise, 4½, each having their own chores to perform in the running of the business along with "Bob" and his wife.

Now all that is needed is the Public's acceptance of the new plastic bag package — to save themselves money — and the new service is "in."

Wins State Championship In Women's Oratory

Hearing Held On Proposed Bus Franchise

Mayor Paul Kilbane and Supervisor Leonard Briggs were in Elmira on Tuesday, March 7th to testify at a hearing in support of a proposed franchise to the Blue Bird Bus Lines. Approximately 40 people, representing various communities, businesses, industries and schools along route 17, appeared in support of the franchise. One person, a representative of the Grand Island Bus Lines, appeared in opposition to the granting of the franchise.

If the franchise is granted the Blue Bird Lines would provide two round trips daily between Jamestown and Corning, N. Y. A pooling arrangement with connecting lines in Corning would provide service east to New York City and from there to all other areas of the country. The terminal at Jamestown would provide connections with other lines west and south. Service would be available also, to Buffalo via Olean with the possibility of a considerable savings in time over the present connections. A favorable decision on the franchise is expected in about 30 days.
